Oakland County Teachers Examination

The next regular teachers' examination will be held at the Congregational church in the city of Pontiac on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, April 24, 25, 26, 1919, beginning at 8:30 a. m. central time.
Applicants may write for first, second or third grade certificates at this examination. The examination in reading for all grades of certificates will be based on the outline in reading published by the Department of Public Instruction, at Ann Arbor, N. J., entitled, "The Teaching of Reading."
Three sections of the examination in theory and art will be based on the "Vitalized School," by Pearson. This book is chosen as one of the Reading Circle books. Three questions of the examination in civil government for all grades of certificates will be based on "American What's Up," by David Jayne Hill. This book is chosen for the Reading Circle of 1919-20. Five questions of the examination for all grades in U. S. History will be based on "Democracy and the Great War," by Fuller, published as bulletin No. 20, by the Department of Public Instruction. The examination for all grades in spelling and orthography will be based on "Word Study and Spelling," published as bulletin No. 10, by the Department of Public Instruction. Reading Circle books may be had from the school commissioner's office.
Candidates taking the R. C. work, or those attending normal schools, will be excused from writing on the subjects of reading and theory and art. The following schedule will be observed at the April and August examinations:
First day—A. M., Orthog. and Spelling, C. S. T. & A. Penmanship.
First day—P. M., Grammar, Reading, Geometry (first grade).
Second day—A. M., Arith. (written and mental Arith., Physiology).
Second day—P. M., Geog., Government, School Law, U. S. History.
Third day—A. M., Alg., Botany, Gen. Phys.
Third day—P. M., First grade applicant only.
No certificate can be granted to any person who has not taken six weeks training in one of the following approved schools: Normal, Kalamazoo Normal, Mt. Pleasant Normal, M. A. C., Ferris Institute, U. of M.
Teachers who taught prior to July 1, 1918, do not have to comply with the above provision of the law.
No certificate can be issued to any person who has failed at the end of 21 is not an American citizen. All candidates are required to write the examination with pen and ink. The county board has adopted the following standards for the year 1919: First grade, average 85%, with a minimum standing of 75%; Second grade, average 80%, with a minimum of 65%; Irregular one subject. An average of 75% is required of all candidates in Arith., Gram., Orthog. and Spelling.
