

# APA Announces Schedule For Ann Arbor Festival

ANN ARBOR The APA Repertory Company will open the eighth consecutive Fall Festival on the University of Michigan campus Sept. 16. Under the aegis of the University of Michigan Theater Program the festival will continue through Oct. 26 in the Lydia Mendelssohn Theater.

HIGHLIGHTING the 1969 festival will be a revival of "Private Lives" with Broadway star Tammy Grimes and leading British actor Brian Bedford.

Noel Coward's gay comedy of manners will climax the APA season under the direction of Stephen Porter. It replaces the earlier announced "Inspector General."

Miss Grimes and Bedford will play the roles originated by Gertrude Lawrence and Coward. The opening production of the APA season will be a new version of "Macbeth" under the direction of Ellis Rabb, APA artistic director. Rabb has replaced "The Time of Your Life" with "Macbeth" after his successful staging of the Shakespearean tragedy this summer at the Old Globe Theatre in San Diego.

Richard Easton will portray the doomed Scottish monarch, his Lady Macbeth will be played by Lada Thompson.

The American premiere of Michel de Ghelderode's "The Chronicles of Hell" under the direction of producer-director John Houseman will be the second production of the festival.

Patrick Hines, former leading man of the American Shakespeare Festival, will portray a corrupt priest, Christopher Walken, seen in Ann Arbor when the Professional Theater Program first presented the Stratford Canada Festival, will also appear in the production.

AFTER the Ann Arbor Festival, the APA is booked for a national tour of colleges and universities, while Rabb begins preparations for his direction of a musical based on Truman Capote's "Grass Harp" in New York.

Subscriptions for reserved seats at discounts for the APA season are on sale at the Professional Theater Program ticket office in the lobby of the Lydia Mendelssohn Theater. Individual tickets are also being sold.

The ticket office is open weekdays from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., and from 2 to 5 p.m. Tickets are also available through Hudson's and Grinnell's.

## Schoolcraft Hosts Four Programs

LIVONIA U.S. Sen. Phillip Hart and Dr. Morton Kaplan, professor of political science at the University of Chicago, are among speakers scheduled for the fall semester Humanities Series at Schoolcraft College.

Three of the four events scheduled for the semester are presented without charge, a \$2 fee will be made to non-students for the fourth event. All attractions are open to the public.

KAPLAN will open the series with two lectures on Thursday, Sept. 25, in the Liberal Arts building theater. He will speak on "Vietnam and the Policy of Intervention," at 3 p.m., and on "The Moral Obligations of Dissenters in the Modern State" at 8 p.m.

As a political thinker and teacher Dr. Kaplan holds views on the political scene and U.S. foreign policy - particularly with regard to Vietnam - differing from those held for example by Dr. Benjamin Spock, who appeared on the Schoolcraft lecture series last year.

### Color Tour Sponsored In October

Detroit A conducted color tour of Michigan's woodland fall color display has been announced by the Metropolitan Detroit YWCA. The trip is scheduled for the weekend of Oct. 11 and 12. The fully equipped chartered motorcoach will leave the Downtown Y, 2230 Witherspoon, on Saturday morning and return early Sunday evening.

Cost of the trip is \$40 per person (plus a YWCA membership of \$5 if you are not already a member) and it includes all transportation, meals, tips and lodging. Further information and reservations may be obtained by contacting the YWCA office at WO 1-9220.

The route, a different one from previous years, will traverse I-75 north through Saginaw and Clare, then on to Cadillac, Benzonis and Benah for the overnight stop at the Westbarn Terrace Motel in Charlevoix.

An optional side trip to the Mackinac Bridge can be arranged for Sunday morning. The return trip will start at Indian River, go to Clare, Lansing and on into Detroit.

Stops are planned for scenic photography and at the studios of Gwen Frostie, artist-publisher, and Muriel Originals' pottery shop where ceramics are made and sold.

## Train Trips To Canada Announced

Detroit Two special fall trips have been announced by the Michigan Railroad Club.

The first is to visit Niagara Falls on Sunday, Sept. 21. Because of the American Falls being dry this year, this trip provides a unique opportunity to see this spectacle.

Bus transportation is provided to the Falls.

The train will leave at 7:30 a.m. (Detroit time) from the Waterman Station in Windsor and arrive at the Canadian National Railways Station in Niagara Falls at 12 noon. The return train will leave at 5:30 p.m. and arrive in Windsor at 10 p.m. Fares have been set at \$15.50 for adults, \$8 for children from five to 11, and \$1 for children under five.

A visit to Stratford, Ontario is scheduled as the second trip on Saturday, Oct. 4. The train will be pulled by a Canadian National Steam Engine, 6218, North Type. There will be photo rumbles, a baggage car with open doors and 110-volt outlets for tape recorders.

Upon arrival at Stratford's Avon River Park there will be an hour layover. The train will leave Windsor at 7:45 a.m. (Detroit time) and return at 5:15 p.m.

Fare for this trip is \$12.50 for adults, \$7 for children from six to 12, and \$1 for children five and under.
