Home Economics Expert Says Way Is to Teach Youth Early Proper Apportioning

"The hest and most natural way of beginning true national economy, wise spending and wise saving," says Ruth Wardell, head of the home eco-nomics department of the University new Wardell, head of the home eco-nomics department of the University of lowa, and who last summer storked a home economics department in a Cleveland (Ohio) bans, "Is by giving the children an allowance. The lesson of properly apportioning an income-thus is early learned."


