NOTICE

Notice of review of special assessment for the improvement of Assessment District Road No. 225, under Act 925, Public Acts of 1919, is amended.

To 10 persons interested in said assessment in the townships of Farmington and Southfield, Oakland County, Livonia and Redford, Wayne County, and to the said township of Farmington, and to the county of Oakland.

Whereas, I, as the State Highway Commissioner of Michigan, have heretofore determined that the highway commencing at the intersection of the Grand River Road, so-called, with the Base Line Road, so-called, at point being also the south line of section 36, town 1 north, range 9 east, Farmington township, Oakland County, Michigan, and on the dividing line between Oakland and Wayne counties, Michigan; thence continuing northwesterly along the present travelled highway, known as the Grand River Road, through sections 36, 35 and 20 of said Farmington township to the easterly boundary line of the Village of Farmington; thence continuing northwesterly along the present travelled highway, known as the Grand River Road, to the westerly boundary line of the village of Farmington; thence continuing northwesterly along the present travelled highway, known as the Grand River Road, to the intersection of the Grand River Road, to the northwest corner of section 25 of said Farmington township, a distance of 1 1/2 miles, more or less, shall be improved in accordance with specifications now on file; and

Whereas, I, as such commissioner, did heretofore determine the boundaries of the proposed special assessment district No. 225 for said highway known as assessment district road No. 225 to be as follows: Said district includes all lands within the following boundaries, to-wit:

Commencing at the south corner common to sections 34 and 35, town 1 north, range 9 east, Farmington township, Oakland County; thence north 1/4 mile on the section line between sections 34 and 35 to the 1/2 post common to sections 34 and 35; thence west 3/4 mile on the east and west 1/2 line of sections 34, 33, 32 and 31 to the center of section 31; thence north 3/4 mile on the north and south 1/2 line of sections 31, 30, 19 and 18 to its intersection with the north east-and-west 1/4 line of section 18; thence east 1 1/2 miles on the north east-and-west 1/4 line of sections 18, 17 and 16 to its intersection with the west north-and-south 1/4 line of section 16; thence south 1/4 mile on the west north-and-south 1/4 mile of section 16 to its intersection with the east and west 1/2 line of section 16; thence east one mile on the said east and west 1/2 line of sections 16 and 15 to its intersection with the west north-and-south 1/4 line of section 15; thence south 1 1/2 miles on the said west north-and-south 1/4 line of sections 15 and 22 to its intersection with the section line between sections 22 and 27; thence east 1/4 mile on the section line between sections 22 and 27 to the corner of sections 22, 23, 24 and 27; thence south 1/4 mile on the section line between sections 20 and 27 to the 1/2 post common to sections 20 and 27; thence east 3/4 mile on the east and west 1/2 line of sections 20 and 25; said Farmington township, and section 30, town 1 north, range 10 east, Southfield township, Oakland County, to the center of section 30; thence south 2 miles on the north and south 1/2 line of sections 30 and 31, said Southfield township, Oakland County, and section 4, town 1 south, range 10 east, Redford township, Wayne

County, to the center of section 6, said Redford township; thence west 2 1/2 miles on the east and west 1/2 line of section 6, said Redford township, Wayne County, and sections 1 and 2, town 1 south, range 9 east, Livonia township, Wayne County, to the 1/2 post common to sections 2 and 3; thence north 1/4 mile on the section line between sections 2 and 3, and Livonia township, to the Oak and Wayne county line; thence along the Oakland-Wayne county line to the south corner common to sections 34 and 35, said Farmington township, being the point of beginning.

And all lands in the townships of Farmington and Southfield, Oakland County, Livonia and Redford, Wayne County, within the boundaries above described will be liable to an assessment

for the benefits for the improvement of said highway, and also the township of Farmington, Oakland County, and the county of Oakland, at large.

Now, therefore, all owners of lands within the above described boundaries in the townships of Farmington and Southfield, Oakland County, Livonia and Redford, Wayne County, and all persons interested in said lands and the township of Farmington, Oakland County and the County of Oakland, are hereby notified that I will be present at the

Farmington Township Hall,

in the village of Farmington, within the proposed assessment district at ten o'clock, a. m., on the

16th day of May,

A. D. 1919, and announce my assess-

ment of benefits upon the lands within the said boundaries constituting said special assessment district, and upon the township of Farmington, Oakland County, and the county of Oakland, at large, and the said assessment of benefits will be open to review. All persons or the said township or county may appear and be heard with respect to their several apportionments of benefits for said highway.

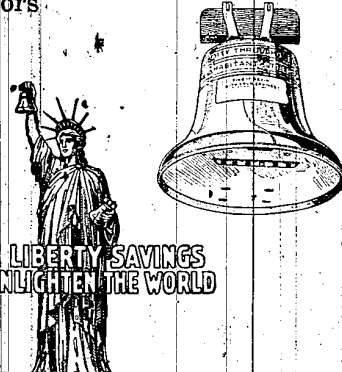

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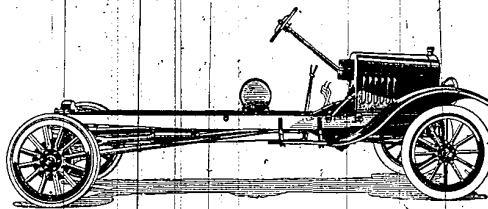
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
