

Holy Cross St. Matthew Sets Classes For Children On Half-Days

A service and recital for dedication of a new Wicks pipe organ is scheduled at 4 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 21, in Holy Cross Lutheran Church, 30650 Six Mile, Livonia.

The public is invited to hear the guest organist Donald Brown demonstrate the varied possibilities of the organ by accompanying solo and duet vocalists, trumpet, strings, both children and adult choir and by presenting a group of organ selections.

Brown has been organist at Cedar Drive Faith Lutheran Church since 1966. He has studied at Concordia Teachers College, River Forest, Ill.; The University of Michigan, and Cleveland Institute of Music. He holds a B.S. degree in education from Concordia, a master's degree from U-M, and is presently enrolled in a doctoral program in music at Michigan State University. The Wicks organ, manufactured at Highland, Ill., was constructed at Holy Cross in March of this year, and has been in use since that time. The organ consists of 11 ranks. It is 90 per cent the gift of one donor.

As a service to school children currently on half-day sessions in Livonia, St. Matthew's United Methodist Church will offer a series of classes beginning Oct. 1 and continuing 10 to 15 weeks.

The church said the plans for the classes were continuing despite the uncertain status of the half-day sessions following the recent court decision.

should a bishop try to control the selection of his successor? In the Catholic Church there is currently an international agitation for his right of local clergy and laity at least to nominate, if not elect, their own bishops, rather than having them appointed by Rome.

Even should this measure of democratic selection ever come to pass, however, it will still leave the possibility of bishops perpetuating their reigns by influencing the choice of their successors—as is apparently the case in the Episcopal Church in Hawaii.

For a record 24 years, the Episcopal Missionary District of Honolulu has been run with an almost unbroken continuity of an old-time sugar plantation by the Rt. Rev. Harry S. Kennedy, who has rigidly controlled clergy appointments. Bishop Kennedy, a lithe, impressive figure with a compelling personality and speaking technique, is one of Hawaii's few clergymen to endorse Dr. Fred Schwartz and his Christian Anti-Communism Crusade.

JUST PRIOR to his retirement last year, Bishop Kennedy quietly appointed a committee to nominate his successor. This committee, the Rev. Burton Lincolnton and laymen Hugh Shearer and Sam Liu, conducted secret meetings during which they

presented the three nominations to the Episcopal House of Bishops. Such nomination by a local committee of clergy and laymen appeared sufficiently "grass roots" to the House of Bishops, who elect all bishops of missionary districts.

YET WHEN Massachusetts' highly regarded Bishop Anson Phelps Stokes (a former dean of St. Andrews Cathedral, Honolulu) discovered the origin of the nominations, the House of Bishops abruptly changed the election from that of a coadjutor bishop (with automatic right of succession) to that of a suffragan bishop (an assistant bishop, with no such right).

Instead of throwing out the secret nominations and demanding that Hawaiian Episcopates as a whole be given some voice in the selection of their new bishop, Kennedy's fellow prelates in the Episcopal House proceeded to elect the Rev. Mr. Hanchett.

Suffragan Bishop Hanchett, who attended two years of college and three months of theological seminary (out was

awarded a Doctorate in Divinity by Berkeley's Church Divinity School of the Pacific, this June), is noted for his sweet and gentle manner, as well as his devotion to—and absence of disagreement with — Bishop Kennedy.

The election having been accomplished, Bishop Kennedy retired and Episcopal Presiding Bishop John E. Hines appointed Hanchett "Bishop in charge." The effect of Harry Kennedy, whose mold Hanchett appears to be fitting nicely, appears to be lessening, for instance, the new Suffragan preached at an ordination service that clergy could not afford the luxury of dealing with controversial social issues.

He has also written: "I hope that we will all be extra careful with how we deal with the matter of the election of the diocesan bishop. Some of the publicity we have been receiving in the newspapers has not helped the image of the Church in the community and I hope that this kind of thing can be kept at a minimum if not stopped."

In most Episcopal dioceses a retiring bishop's endorsement of any clergyman to succeed him is a kiss of death. But Harry Kennedy, who has been termed "The Episcopal Pope of the Pacific," appears likely to continue ruling from retirement.

The Temple Beth Am Sunday School will again be open to the children of non-members on a one year basis. This year the Temple will initiate its own Hebrew Program, taught by Rabbi Chacter, Rabbi LeBourien, Mrs. David Davidson and Mrs. Melvyn Case.

Members of the Temple joined with Jews throughout the world in observing the great Days of Awe, a 10-day period beginning with the Jewish New Year, Rosh Hashanah, and culminating in the Day of Atonement, Yom Kippur.
