Annual Meeting of District Largely Attended Monday Evening

The largest annual school meeting ever remembered in Farmington as sembled at the school house last Monday evening, and elected one lady, Miss Esther Boynton, as a membe

The director's report was read and accepted, showing a balance on hand at the beginning of hast year of \$1,891, and the receipts for the year as \$1,3854, making a total of \$165,227.46 in the general fuhd. The disbursements for the year were \$16,953.99, leaving a balance in the treasury on July 14, 1913, of \$174.05.

The total receipts in the building fund were \$47,587.18, leaving a balance of \$127.87, atter the contract work on the new building was all settled for. There being a number of extras yet to purchase for the new building and the old building inceding cleaning and redecorating, it was voted to transfer the balance in the building fund to the general fund, making a total in the treasury of \$301.92.
