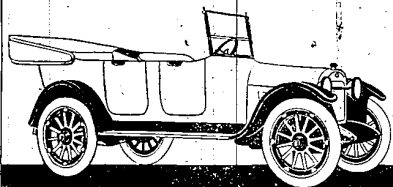

Mr. and Mrs. Carl Uley and family visited relatives in Flint from Thursday until Sunday.

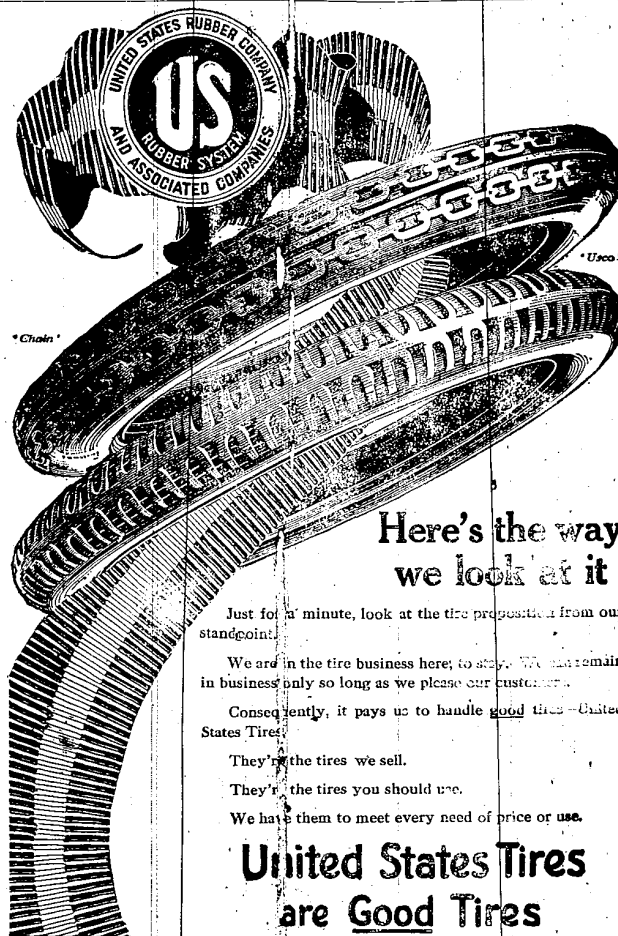

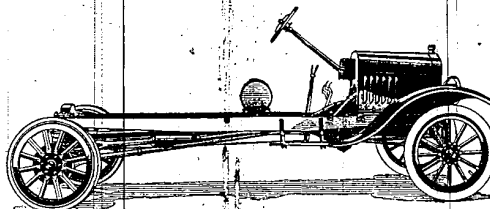
