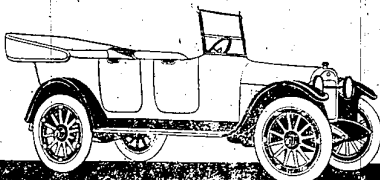

Arthur Greene and family spent Sun-

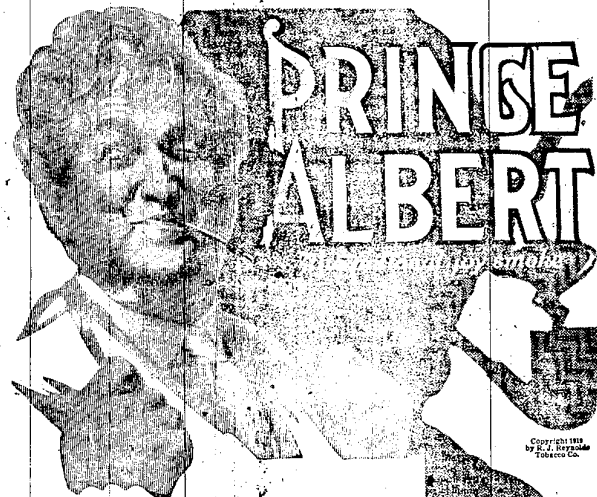
day at the home of H. N. McCracken.

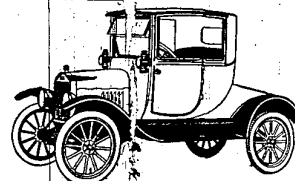

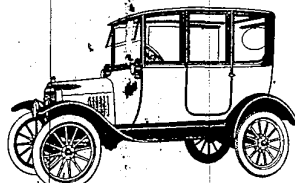
