28 Seek Nine Charter Positions

The race is underway for the charter commission election Nov. 4 with 28 candidates seeking nine seats on the commission.

If voters approve the question of consolidation Nov. 4, nine commissioners will be elected to write a charter for the single city.

The question calls for the consolidation of the four governments of the City of Farmington, Farmington Township, Wood Creek Farms and Quakertown into a new, single city. If consolidation passes, representation on the charter commission will be five for the township, two for the city, and one commissioner each for the villages.

OF THE 28 candidates filed, 18 filed for the township for the five seats. Seven candidates are in the field for the city's two seats while Quakertown has two candidates for its single seat.

In Wood Creek Farms, David A. Goldman is running unopposed.

Squared off in Quakertown are Gerald Ellsworth and Richard C. Habicht.

City candidates include: Rich-

ard Tepper, Robert Sawyer, Donald F. Weldy Jr., Robert S. Hanes, Wesley A. Robertson Jr., Lyle L. Hall and Charles F. Smith.

Farmington Township's ballot will list 18 candidates but actually the degree of competition is the same for city and township.

Both city and township ballots will show 3 1/2 candidates vying for each seat available on the commission.

AMONG THE LAST group of township residents to file for the commission were: Howard I. Bond; Frederic W. Fairfield; Gerald A. Freedman; Walter T. Frontczak; M.N. James; Arnold S. Michlin; Robert B. Pierce; Richard J. Wallace and Ronald Wyssnoid.

Pierce, along with Fred Lichman and Kenneth Perrin, were leaders of the 1967 move to incorporate the township minus the two villages and Section 1.

Freedman is a leader in the 19th Democratic District in Oakland County. Wyssnoid is an administrator for Garden City schools.

Other candidates from the township are: Richard Gould; Wayne F. Parkinson; William Stone; William H. Haines; John

T. Bally; Joseph T. Brennan; John H. Burke; Thomas Gust and Carl Thorpe.

DEADLINE FOR voter registration is 8 p.m. Oct. 3, which is only nine days away. Special registration hours will be held Saturday, Sept. 27, from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m.

Residents must register in the vicinity in which they live. City residents should register in the city hall at 23600 Liberty at Grand River, one block west of Farmington Rd. Township residents must register at the township hall at 11 Mile and Orchard Lake.

Quakertown residents must register at the home of Village Clerk Mattie Strasser, 34027 Cotswold. Wood Creek Farms residents must register at the home of their clerk at 29251 Spring Rd.

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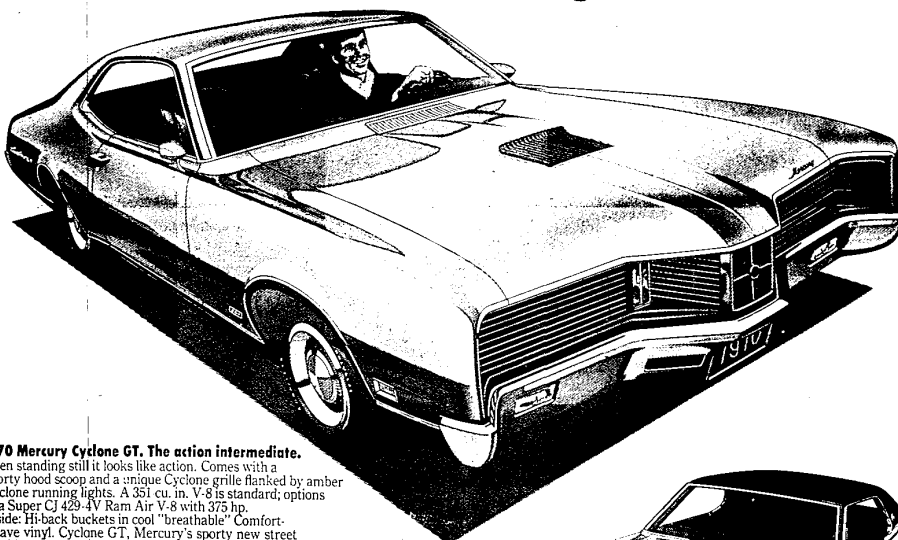

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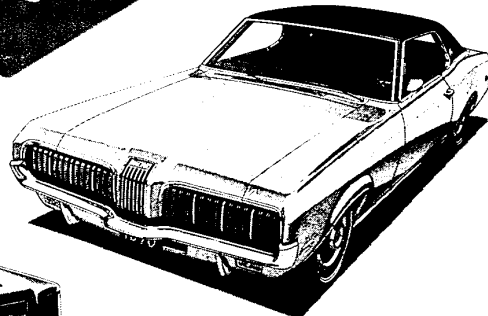

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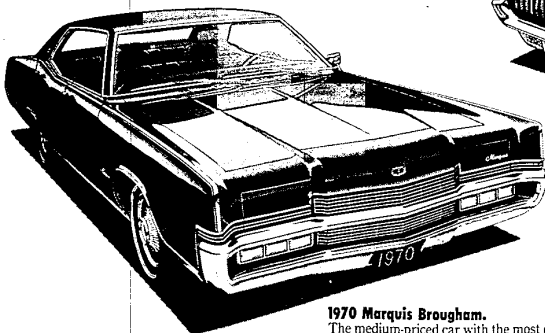
