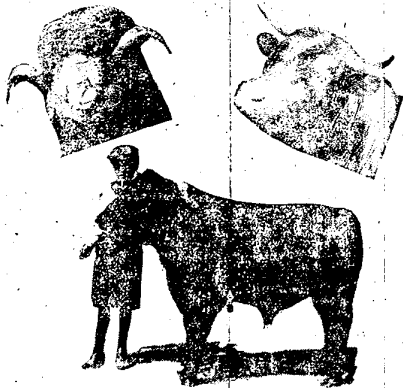

The county and district winners get trips to the fair, with all expenses paid, and there they contest among themselves for the state championship in judging animals. They not only see the best livestock in the state, but they are given the best of expert instruction on the "points" of pure-bred stock. G. W. Dickinson, Secretary-Manager of the fair, says that a boy who learns how to judge good livestock isn't very likely to raise poor grades. This year, the team of three winning boys will be sent to the International Livestock Show at Chicago, with all expenses paid, to compete nationally.

Mr. and Mrs. Marley Bachelor and two children, visited friends in Farmington, Friday.

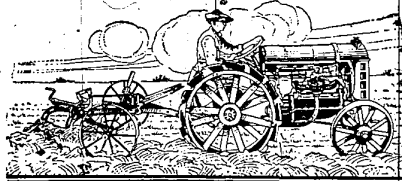
Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Lamb and Viola, and Mrs. Lora Ranous, of Farmington, were calling here Saturday.
