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## Sun heats home

The easiest way to bring solar heat into a home is through a win-dow on the south wall.

This idea was pointed out 33 years ago by the Small Homes Council-Building Research Council of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

Champaign.

Despite gray winter skies, the three winter months—December, January and February—average four to five hours of sunshine or more daily from the Midwest to the Rockies.

This can belp with the heating bill if sunlight comes through a large enough window in a well-insulated building. The insulation frust include double or triple glazing of the windows.

of the windows.

For a super-insulated house with triple-glazed windows, an adequate south window area is only eight per cent of the floor area. More may not increase the heating effect and may increase summer cooling problems.

problems. Windows for solar heat must be on the south side of the house, and the roof overtiang can be coordinated with window location and size to admit sunlight in winter and to shade the windows in summer.
