

Andover cagers shock Brother Rice, 58-53

Victory was especially sweet for Andover basketball coach John Maloney, Tuesday at Seaholm. His Barons upset highly touted Birmingham Brother Rice 58-53 in Class A district basketball action.

"It was unbelievably satisfying,"

Maloney said, "because I beat the guy I respect the most, Rice coach Bill Norton."

Maloney played for Norton as a student at Rice. He was also Norton's assistant coach for five years, before taking over Andover's team this season.

His strategy was simple: Hold

Rice's star center, 6-11 junior Tim Andre, in check and force the Warriors to shoot from the outside.

"I don't think that being my former assistant coach had anything to do with the game," said Rice's Norton.

"Andover was prepared, well-coached and they played inspired."

"We had trouble handling their half-

court press," Norton said. "As the game stayed close, there was more pressure on our outside shooting. We missed our shots. They shot well from the outside."

ANDOVER SHOOTERS were 50 per cent from the field, making 23 of 46 attempts. Tim Meter led the Barons

with 17 points, eight of 14 field goal tries. Bill Hertle tossed in 15 for Andover, seven of 13 from the field.

Tim Andre was the only Rice player in double figures with 19 points. As a team, Rice was 22 of 59 from the field for 37 per cent.

Rice had led by five points at the end of the first and second quarters, and by three following the third quarter.

Mid-way through the second quarter, Andover was 14 points behind Rice, 24-10. The Barons outscored Rice 12-4 before halftime.

Jump shots by Galen David and Tim Meter gave Andover the lead early in the fourth quarter, 39-38.

The lead changed hands four more times until Meter's three-point play

put the Barons on top for good with 3:22 to play.

Rice outrebounded Andover 39-24. Vince Tushie led the Warriors with 11. Andre had eight.

The victory left Andover with a 12-9 season mark.

Seaholm surprises Rochester

Coach Bob Sherwood of Seaholm discussed strategy for the remaining two district tournament games.

Meanwhile, Rochester coach John Bailey leaned against a wall in his team's locker room, forced a smile and shook his head back and forth.

Seaholm, the cellar-dweller of the Southeastern Michigan Association, had just upset Rochester 74-67, in the opening day of Class A district basketball tournament action at Seaholm.

Rochester, now 10-10 on the year, still has a chance to claim a share of the Greater Oakland Activities League title, if it can beat Millford, in a March 7 game, which is a makeup of one cancelled by the recent snow storm.

For Seaholm, it was the third victory of the season against 17 losses.

"We have been playing better basketball the second half of the season," Sherwood said, "but it doesn't show in our record because we've played many teams with state and metro rankings."

"THE TOUGH competition we've played helped," Sherwood said. "We've had close-game experience. When Rochester regained the lead early in the fourth quarter it would have been easy for our team, with the record we have, to pack up our tents

and hit it for the season."

Rochester's Bailey said he was surprised with Seaholm.

"They matched up with us," Bailey said, "that's what bothered us. They made a defensive adjustment against our offense and we didn't make any adjustment."

"We're all real disappointed," Bailey said. "We know we're capable of playing much better basketball than we showed tonight."

Rochester jumped to a seven-point lead easily during the early moments of the game. Seaholm cut the lead to five going into the second period.

A Bob Folin jumper and a Jeff Maher three-point play put Seaholm quickly back in the ball game. Twice during the second quarter Seaholm pulled within one point, but never grabbed the lead.

Tom Dietters and Dave Lewis had each scored 10 points by halftime, giving Rochester a 35-20 halftime edge.

At the start of the third quarter, Seaholm pulled out all the stops. The Maples outscored the Falcons by a 14-4 margin during the first six minutes of the second half, including 10 unanswered points.

With less than two minutes remaining in the third period, Rochester's three-point lead became a seven-point deficit.

ROCHESTER SEEMED to burst the Seaholm victory bubble, when the Falcons clicked off the first eight points of the fourth quarter, grabbing a 51-50 lead only 1:39 into the final quarter.

Mid-way through the period, however, Seaholm scored seven straight points to regain the lead. Some clutch free throw shooting, nine of 11 in the final two minutes, preserved the Seaholm win.

Bob Folin scored 12 of his game-high 24 points in the fourth quarter. He made 10 of 15 field goals, 66 per cent, and four of four free throws.

Jeff Maher added 16, David Keller 14 and Andy Sovran 12 points for Seaholm.

Rochester had three players with 16 points apiece, Al Karala, Tom Dietters and Dave Lewis.

Behind Jeff Vincent's eight rebounds, Rochester had a 30-25 edge

Lathrup icers tie Franklin

Dennis Tardich scored from Andy Marshall at the 10:02 point of the third period to pull Southfield-Lathrup into a four-all tie with Livonia Franklin in a Suburban Hockey League game last Monday at Southfield's Beechwood's Arena.

The stalemate was Lathrup's third of the season to go with four victories and 11 losses. Franklin, the first-place team in the SHL, is closing in on the league championship.
