



# In The Pocket

MARY MOHACSI, a Livonian, was crowned in the Detroit Bowling Hall of Fame last Sunday afternoon before the largest gathering since their inception.

With her were four others—Mike Totsky, Billy Goliembiwski, Lou Ode and Ed Shikany—when the doors to the mythical hall were opened in Cobo Hall.

It was the first time that the ceremonies were held on a Sunday afternoon and the Bowling Proprietors Association, sponsor of the event, possibly will continue the afternoon program.

THE WESTERN SUBURBAN lanes will cater to two of the top events as the tournament season really gets under way.

Garden Lanes will host a portion of the Champion of Champions tournament that annually draws an entry of more than 5,000 teams.

Livonia Lanes will get its share of the spotlight as host of a portion of the annual state-wide charity roll-offs during the weekends of April 29-30 and May 6-7.

WITH ONE OF ITS LARGEST entries in years, the city tournament, sponsored by the Greater Detroit Bowling Association, gets underway

5:30 p.m. Saturday at Satellite Bowl.

The Association has added \$6,000 to the prize fund and the battle for a share of that pot of gold will continue for a month.

A BIT OF HISTORY was written at Garden Lanes last week when John McClellan put together games of 267, 221 and 233 for 721.

It was the first 700 series rolled in the St. Louis league in years. It was one of the high spots of McClellan's bowling career.

In the Moose league, Bob Cuba showed the way with a 632. Bill Montgomery Jr. was right on his heels with a 621, while Wilbur Smitley landed third with a 603.

ANOTHER UNUSUAL 700 series was rolled at Farmington Lanes, where Vic West, bowling in the junior house league, narrowly missed one of the highest triplets of the year.

He opened with a 235, came back with 237 and closed with another 235 for 707.

BETTY MARKWARDT gained a major share of the honors in the Livonia Ladies Classic.

After Lois Flora won the first game with 194-42-225, Betty started her drive by winning the second game with 224-31-255 and the third with 204-

31-235. This gave her the series with 588-30-431.

ANNE TROKE, a counter clerk at Merri-Bowl, has been watching the bowlers for quite a while and her observations stood her in good stead last week.

Stepping on the approaches herself, she rolled games of 200, 219 and 212 for 631.

ALTHOUGH SHE CARRIES only a 143 average, Donna Sanders took the spotlight at Merri-Bowl during the past week when she found the range for a 214 game and a 527 series.

THERE WAS SOME fancy bowling in the Wednesday morning league at Woodland Lanes when Rita Grace came through with a 396 series and Linda Sylvester followed with a 213 in 556. Donna Wilson was next in line with a 207 in 514.

In the Thursday Ladies league, Irene Paradowski fashioned a 212 and Jean Hartigan had a 214.

ONE OF THE HAPPIEST senior citizen bowlers in the area last week was Art Lowry. With an average of a mere 79, he subbed in the league at Plaza Lanes and went 103 pins over his average with a count of 181 after games of 91 and 120. He shared honors with Jay Zink, who had a 444 on games

of 107, 132 and 265.

A FIELD OF MORE than 140 bowlers competed in the junior tournament sponsored by the Canton Township Recreation Department at Super Bowl.

When the final pin had fallen, Kevin Meek topped the junior boys with 750 and Donnie Sutherland paced the girls with 629 for her three games with handicap.

## Distance run

The Southfield Parks and Recreation Department will sponsor its third annual Marathon Run on Saturday, May 6, beginning at 9 a.m. at the Southfield Civic Center complex.

A four-mile cross country course will be laid out over the Civic Center grounds. One race will be held with four age classifications — 17 years of age and younger, 18-30, 31-39 and 40 and older. Medals will be awarded to the top three finishers in each age group. Pre-registration is required by 5 p.m. May 5.
