


Paper takes new forms

Schools to teach Holocaust lessons

"The Holocaust." broadcast by NBC, was for many Americans a first close look at the horrors of human extermination practiced by the Nazis. The program provoked a number of reactions, including urgings by most Jewish groups for public school classes on the holocaust. The Southfield Board of Education passed a resolution last month endorsing holocaust-related classes. Beginning next fall school officials will offer a program to help teachers learn what

a program to help teachers learn what materials are available and how to best teach about that dark period of the 20th century.

"We're not going to teach 'Rise and Fall of the Third Reich' or show the

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entire "Holocaust" every time the subject is brought up." said William Kritzmire, associate superintendent of instruction for Southfield Public Schools.

Intent of the program will be to provide "a continuing awareness and sensitivity" of the lessons learned by the holocaust, he said.

"THERE WILL not be a course called "The Holocaust." But we will continue to deal with the holocaust through various course offerings." Kritzmire said during an interview last upook

last week.

To insure that the subject is taught fully, material relating to the holocaust will be compiled and made available this school year to high

school social science teachers.
In addition, school officials will take a look at existing courses such as political science and history where holocaust information can be added or

Next fall, a program will be develnext fail, a program will be devel-oped for teachers to give them specific information on what and how to teach the subject. The program will include a look at what resources are available and how to use those resources, Kritz-

mire said.

While integrating lessons on genocide into the regular school curriculum may be less than some had hoped for, Kritzmire sers it as a definite step in the right direction. In the past history lessons in most schools never mentioned the holocaust, he said.

"I never heard about it in 16 years of school," he said, "It was never touched on."
Kritzmire said the showing of "The Holocaust" has not resulted in a cry among residents for holocaust-related classes. Many residents in Southfield, he said, are already aware of the meaning of the holocaust and have acknowledged the school board's willingness to maintain and heighten that awareness.

THE DEMAND for holocaust classes has been diminished by the fact that some high shool classes presently deal with the subject, he said.

Nationally, sociologists and educations maintain that educating Americans about the Holocaust is the only way to prevent future atroicties.

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


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
