right. Cut a square of canvas measuring 40 threads across the top and 42 threds per side. Trim away mubbs so that edges are smooth.

Sitch the beak with gold yarn. Place the arrowed stitches first and then stitch the line at right angles to them. Finally outline he beak.



Use red yard to work long stitches that form the bird's breast and neck. In the bird's breast and neck. In the breast area, yarn moves from wing to wing in one long stitch. Use as many strands per needlefull as needed to cower the canwas.
Use one strand of red wool to lad your couching threads at right angles to the long stitches. Position couching threads and tack them to the canwas with tent stitches where indicated.

grammed. Notice that the inside wing stitches cover the ends of breast stitches. Possition couching threads and with the stitches and agrammed. Carefully cut away canvas between border and bird, leaving only the eight hreads indicated. Trim around the bird carefully, not cutting into wool. A sliver of canvas thread may be left outside the stitching if necessary. Remove all possible nubs around the edge and the remaining threads.

Thread two needles with red wool one with the usual number of yarn strands, and the other with only one strand. Anchor both behind the bird. Lay the multiple strands around the outer edge of the bird, and whip into place with the single strand. This will hide any remaining canvas edges.
