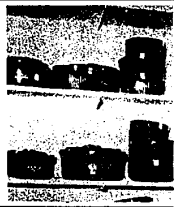

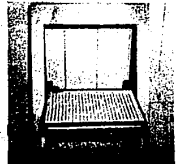
**Preservation for dads**

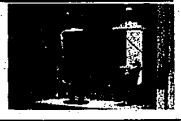
