Candidates reveal differences over plans for college's growth

The pending and proposed expansion of Oakland Community College's (OCC) physical plant and course offerings has split the candidates for the board of trusted plant and course offerings. The multi-campus college is in the midst of an unprecedented, ambitious expansion of program offerings. The multi-campus college is well underway in renovating its Southeast Campus System. OCC will also build a new police academy in Madison Heights.

Speaking at a recent meeting of the college's major faculty organization, the Faculty Forum, some candidates criticized the planned expansion and argued about the direction of that expansion. Other candidates avoided the issue.

LILA JOHNSON, one of two incumbents up for reelection and a member of the board of trustees since

1964, defended OCC's recently unveiled plans.
She said the new Southeast Campus facilities are merely replacing outmoded classrooms, labs and libraries.
"The facilities in the southeast section of the county will house students who are already there," she said. "They're now being housed in old dupermarkets and a 50-year-old school. "They're being denied good chemistry labs. Libraries," forget it. I'd go over to the Huntington Woods library," said Mrs. Johnson, a Huntington Woods resident.

JOHN BOWKER of Bloomfield Hills immediately challenged those premises.

Bowker said facilities should be leased first to test how marketable the programs and the areas will be to the said that the programs and the areas will be to the said that the programs and the areas will be programs.

"It's the easiest thing to spend

money. But the national landscape is dotted with million-dollar blunders," be said.

SANDRA RITTER, a 31-year-old Detroit public school teacher who lives in Waterford, said the college does not need to expand. Instead, she said, OCC needs to improve its current programs

needs to improve its current programs and facilities. Speaking specifically of the Highland Lakes campus in Union Lake, Mrs. Ritter said, "I know what's there and I know what should be there. They definitely need some improvements." Other candidates vying for the two six-year terms are Dennis Rogers, an incumbent from Troy and Marylin Levinson of West Bloomfield.


