Livonia, C'ville candidates oppose school merger

Two Livonia and three Clarenceville school district candidates running for seats in the June 12 board of education elections are split 41 in opposing a merger or reorganization of the two districts.

They made their comments at a candidates' meeting co-sponsored Wednesday night by The Observer Newspapers and the League of Women Voters of Livonia and in a questionaire sent to the five by the same organizations.

At the public candidates session, held in the Livonia Senior Citizens' Center, Clarenceville candidates

Lorene Erickson and Michael Zahn plus Livonia candidate James Merner said they were opposed to any sugges-ted merger.

Clarenceville board incumbent Dan-iel Morrison, who dight make the con-didates' session, made his position in writing as part of the Observer-LWV questionnaire.
Only Thomas Davis, Livonia board member seeking a second four-year term, was in lavor of a consolidation of the district.
It was Davis who proposed the con-solidation more than a year ago and be admitted Wednesday that it was met

"with something less than enthusiasm" by his colleagues on the Livonia board and his counterparts on the Clarenceville board. Livonia's district covers most of the city of Livonia and the six square miles along the northern portion of Westland.

resuand. Clarenceville includes the northeast Clarencevitie includes the normalist corner of Westland, a section of Farmington and Farmington Hills along the Grand River-Eight Mile area, and a small part of the northwest corner of Redford Township, in the Eight Mile Inkster Road area.

Davis, in supporting the consoli-

dation, said it would be a "neat and quick way to save money and offer improved programs."

But his opponent, Merner, said that be wouldn't agree to any consolidation unless all involved school boards

unless all involved school boards agreed to have a study. On a short range basis, there would be nothing to gain, Memer said, while on a long range basis, there may be some administrative savings.

Mrs. Erickson,seeking one of two four-year terms, said that the Clarenceville board has cut its administrative saving.

A merger "would hurt our students and the value put in our buildings." In his written statement, Morrison was also opposed to a consolidation. Clarence-ville has three elementary schools, two in Livoria and one in

Farmington Hills, with the junior and senior high in Livonia. Like its neighboring districts, it has been losing studert enrollments in recent years. It was forced to close one elementary several years ago and it was leased to New Horizons for use by handicapped persons.
