New Series On Divorce Scheduled

Four courses in "Adjustment to Divorce" under the auspices of the Michigan Inter-Professional Association on Marriage, Divorce and the Family, Inc., were announced today by Norman N. Robbins, association president.

Designed to assist persons who are involved in the process of marital dissolution, the scheduled lecture-discussion series

will deal with social and psychological aspects of divorce, child rearing, remarriage, and related problems. The first series is scheduled for the Westland Shopping Center, Room B, on Thursday nights, Oct. 2, 9, 16 and 23, from 7:30 to 9 p.m. Other series will be held at Macomb Mall in November; the South Oakland YMCA, Royal Oak in March; and the Northland Shopping Center in April.

A television correspondent who covers the White House and a governor's wife who has 10 children will be speakers in Town Hall openings next week.

Dan Rather, correspondent for CBS-TV, will launch the Livonia Town Hall series at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 15, in the Terrace Theater, 20400 Plymouth, Livonia.

The Farmington Town Hall will present Mrs. Richard J. Hughes, whose husband is governor of New Jersey, at 11 a.m. Thursday, Oct. 16, in the Northland Theater, Southfield.

Celebrity luncheons will follow both talks. Robert McBride of TV 2 will introduce Rather, who has covered many political conventions and campaigns as well as the assassination of President John F. Kennedy and civil rights stories in the southern states.

Tickets for the four-lecture Livonia series will be available at the door. The price is \$10. Senior citizens, including men, are invited to attend the lectures and may purchase tickets for half price.

Student tickets are offered at 50 cents per lecture.

The Livonia Celebrity luncheon will be held in the Mayflower Meeting House, Plymouth. The price is \$3.75, and those planning to attend are asked to send checks to Livonia Town Hall, Box 2143, Livonia, with postmarks no later than Friday, Oct. 10.

Proceeds from the Livonia Town Hall support the American Field Service program in Livonia.

Mrs. William Milliken, wife of Michigan's Republican governor, will introduce Mrs. Hughes, wife of a Democratic chief executive, in the Farmington lecture.

Mrs. Hughes is known for several magazine articles she has written, discussing her weight loss of 80 pounds, her ideas on rearing her 10 youngsters and the problems that go with being a public figure.

The celebrity luncheon will be held in Glen Oaks Country Club, and luncheon reservations may be made by calling 474-5522 or 474-4229 by Friday, Oct. 10.

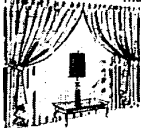
Goodwill Sale Begins Nov. 7

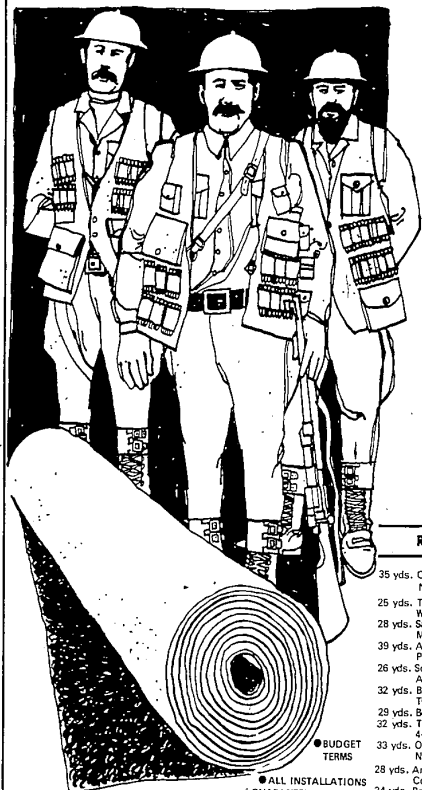
