Learning Resource Center Opens

All of these activities, without any group interfering with another, were happening simultaneously last week in the new "Library Learning Resource Center" in William Grace Elementary School, 29040 Shiawasse.

THE CENTER is a 3,800-square-foot addition which was dedicated at an open house recently. Parents, whom Principal Nicholas Abid credited with promoting the center, filled the new facility for the event.

Parents regularly assist with chores at the resource center and act as kindergarten aides.

The PTA was so anxious to augment equipment for the center that they reimbursed summer traveling teachers for artifacts from as far away as Africa. The objects are now displayed in the center.

TWO WORKROOMS, a conference room, and a large storage area for audio-visual materials surround the large carpeted library area. All the equipment had to be stored in the school's lobby and hallways before the center was completed.

One small room off the library area has been equipped as a science laboratory, with reliefs of the earth on a wall and equipment stored in glass-fronted cabinets.
"Our staff's response to the beauty of the new addition has been just tremendous," said Mrs Leona Crouse, director of the resource center. "It inspires everyone to do his very best when it is so obvious that the children are really developing as a result of individualized techniques.

"We couldn't operate so successfully without the complete cooperation of our gym teacher, speech therapist, reading specialist, art and music consultants. And of course the classroom teacher is the pivot around whom all of this revolves," Mrs. Crouse said.

Mrs. Winnifred Voorhees, school librarian, was particularly excited about the rack of paperbacks for sale.

"We" he mobbed and completely sold out in no time," she said happily, "but we can then use the money to go right back and buy more books."

SHE ASSERTS the paperback sale approach stimulate: a good reading habits. Average price of the books is 30 cents and the rack contains everything fron "Peanuts" to the classics. And other concept which pleases Mrs. Voorhees is "open circulation." New at the elementar y level, the plan allows children to use the lib- arry just as they would a public library four af ternoons a week.

Acce. rding to the librarian, teachers are thrilled by their students' response to this freedom. Reading habits are being greatly improved as the youngsters move from "must to may."





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
