4 From NHF Vie For Merit Grants

Principal Clayton Graham has announced that four students at North Farmington High School have been named semifinalists in the 1969-70 National Merit Scholarship Program. The students are Teri Davis, Bob Hamilton, Lee Katterman and Jim Marchiori. They will compete with 15,000 contestants across the nation for about 3,000 merit scholarships to be awarded next spring.

Qualifying tests were given in February to 750,000 high school students. About 97 per cent are expected to become finalists, and each will be considered for one of the 1,000 National Merit \$1,000 scholarships which are allocated by the state.

Many will also be considered for the renewable four-year merit scholarships provided by some 400 corporations, foundations, colleges, unions, trusts, professional associations, other organizations and individuals.

Winners of four-year scholarships may receive up to \$1,500 a year for four college years, depending on their individual need. Winners of the \$1,000 scholarships will receive their non-renewable one-time awards upon enrollment as full time students in accredited U.S. colleges or universities.

High school grades, accomplishments, leadership qualities and extra-curricular achievements of the finalists will be evaluated along with test scores in selecting winners. Some students received letters of commendation for their high performance in February's test. They scored in the upper two per cent of those who will
