Area tennis coaches voted by secret ballot, nominating the 10 top netters, including nine plyers who made it to the state finals in their respective clas-ses. This elite group also claims five state champions.

Pinchoff recorded an impressive 211
mark. He led coach Greg Kopec's
team to a Greater Ozdand Activities
League crown and a regional title. The
Laker standout is also a retionally
ranked junior 18-and under player. In
November he reached the finals of the
U.S. National 185 indoor event.
Just before embarking on his high
exicol season, Pinchoff made the
quarterfinals in the prestigious Easter

Bowl. His plans now are to graduate from West Bloomfield in Januaray and perhaps attend a west coast school, according to Kopec.
