Novi City Councilwoman Martha Hoyer has challenged incumbent 24th District County Commissioner Dennis Murphy in the Aug. 8 primary for the right to face Democrat Lew Coy in the November election.

Hills. The part-time position pays
\$10,000 a year.

MURPHY WAS elected to the 24th District post two years ago, when the previous commissioner and current Democratic candidate, Lew Coy, decided to step down. Coy served six years as a Republican, but switched parties because of political infighting. 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



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
