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Incumbent challenged in 24th district race

Novi City Councilwoman Martha Hoyer has challenged incumbent 24th District County Commissioner Dennis Murphy in the Aug. 8 primary for the right to face Democrat Lew Coy in the November election.

Murphy, also of Novi, and Mrs. Hoyer have already taken jobs at each other in the district, which includes the western part of Farmington Hills. "Let's put it this way," Murphy said when asked about the Novi councilwoman's decision to run, "I look at her filing as a joke."

"I don't know why a person of Martha's stature in the community has decided to take on an incumbent Republican as a Republican when, to the best of my knowledge, she has never been active except for passing out literature for a representative a couple years ago."

"As far as I'm concerned, she's a Democrat."

Mrs. Hoyer said she is running because she is not satisfied with Murphy's performance. She said she chose to run on the Republican side because she has leaned toward that party in the past.

"Quite frankly, I feel the 24th District has been ignored by the county as far as the return of tax dollars compared to tax dollars contributed," she said. "And in the past two years, I haven't seen anything done about it."

The county commissioner for the 24th District represents the cities of Novi, Wixom, Walled Lake, South Lyon and portions of Farmington Hills. The part-time position pays \$10,000 a year.

MURPHY was elected to the 24th District post two years ago, when the previous commissioner and current Democratic candidate, Lew Coy decided to step down. Coy served six years as a Republican, but switched parties because of political infighting. Murphy says he had been planning strategy to employ against Coy, but will have to change his plans because of the Hoyer challenge.

"I don't understand what the hell she's doing," Murphy said.

"If Martha beats me in the primary, there is no way she can beat Lew Coy in November because Martha is an unknown outside of Novi. And Novi does not swing the vote."

Murphy said he will let his record speak for itself. He said he would be getting together information detailing his accomplishments on the board.

Murphy's record will also be a main topic of Mrs. Hoyer's campaign.

Mrs. Hoyer said she will make voters aware of Murphy's poor attendance record at board meetings. Murphy had the worst attendance record of any of the 27 county commissioners

in 1977, missing more than one-third of board and committee meetings.

MURPHY CONTENDS, however, that he will be much better able to serve the residents of the 24th District because of his experience and the people he knows.

Murphy was the focus of a considerable amount of attention last winter when members of the Novi City Council and administration started a campaign to make the county take better care of Novi roads.

City Mgr. Ed Kriewall charged the county road trucks had not been taking care of the city as they were supposed to. Many calls were placed to Murphy, asking him to use his influence to improve the maintenance of city roads.

Murphy later made a rebuttal to the comments made against the county before the Novi City Council. He told the council he thought, under the conditions, the road crews had done a good job.

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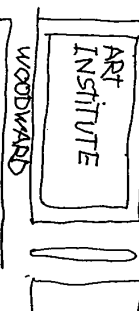
