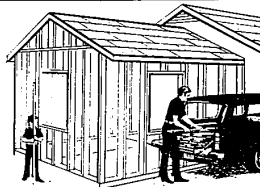
Arnold Klein Gallery—A show of color etchings, aquatints and mezzotints will run through June 30. This will be the gallery's last formal show until
