


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### Moms and pops switching roles

"I get to see what my wife does dur-ing the day. She gets to see how nerve-wracking my job is and the discipline it takes to work at home. The children have seen me at my best and at my worst."

AN ONLY CHILD, Fiorletta said he was aware of the roles his parents had. His father was the traditional bread-winner, performing any jobs that required his mother lifting more than 20 pounds, he said. Fiorletta sees himself and his family as nontraditional, although he is performing as studies indicate all fathers may some day.

"Being a father implied the major duty of providing for my family. The girls give us a tremendous amount of pleasure.

"As they get older, I see my role as preparing them. I don't believe in leaving education and discipline to schools alone. I see my role as educator and trainer." Fiorietta said.
