

Oakland rights advocates plan march on Washington

that more than 1,000 ERA sympathizers from Michigan will descend on Washington to show their colors.

They will join delegations from more than 145 organizations which will march on the U.S. Capitol to demonstrate their support both for ERA and its extension. Proposed is a seven-year extension of the ratification deadline, which presently is set for March 1979.

"We envision a spectacular event that will stir the emotions of those who

value human dignity and justice for all," said Eleanor Smeal, national president of NOW. "We propose a reenactment of the suffrage marches which will link us with our history and provide a unique format for the struggle for Constitutional rights for women."

COSTUMES, pageantry and a color guard will be part of the march which will be followed by a program at the Capitol.

Among those participating in the program will be U.S. Reps. Don Edwards, Elizabeth Holtzman, Margaret Heckler, Barbara Mikulski and Midge Costanza, special assistant to the President.

Ms. Snow will fly to Washington July 9 with about 60 other Michigan activists.

"I'll be leaving my folks who are visiting here from Texas, but they understand," she said. "I don't think

The City of Farmington Hills Planning Commission will give formal consideration to a proposed amendment to the text of the City of Farmington Hills Zoning Ordinance, which Amended Ordinance would be put in read as follows:

Section 1.

Section 03.02, Height Limit. is hereby amended by adding regulations pertaining to the height of amateur radio towers and antennae, which Section shall read as follows:

S2C. and S2E. HEIGHT LIMITS:

1. The height limitations of this Ordinance shall not apply to farm buildings, chimneys, church spires, flag poles or public monuments; provided, however, that the Board of Appeals may specify a height limit for any such structure when such structure requires authorization as a use permitted by the City of Farmington Hills Ordinance, and the Planning Commission may specify a height limit for any such structure when such structure requires authorization as a use permitted on this Ordinance.
2. The height limitations of this Ordinance shall not apply to wireless transmission towers and/or antennae for licensed noncommercial radio stations subject to the following conditions:
 - a. The height of the tower and/or antennae shall not exceed the distance such tower/antennae is set back from the nearest lot line, and in no instance shall the height exceed seventy-five (75') feet.
 - b. The base of the tower shall be located in the rear yard and shall be located within ten (10') feet of the rear of the main building, and provided further that the tower shall not be located closer than five (5') feet to the area described by an imaginary extension of the side yard.
 - c. Guy wires may not be strung within the front or side yards.
 - d. Towers or antennae shall be subject further to the requirements of the Building Department of the City of Farmington Hills.
 - e. No more than one (1) tower may be located on a single lot.
