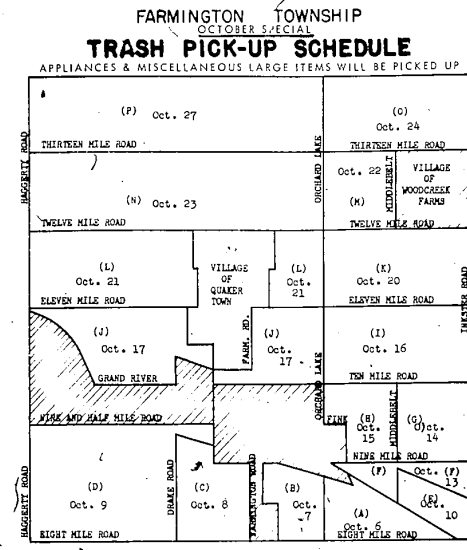
Trash Pickup Continues North Of Nine Mile

FARMINGTON Township's special trash pickup efforts have been completed in Section 36, between Eight and Nine Mile Rds., and Monday crews will enter neighborhoods north of Nine Mile.

During the drive, which ends Oct. 27, residents may put out large items such as appliances, furniture and tires to be picked up.

Studio couches or divanets must be broken down before they will be picked up. Pickups will be on the regularly scheduled days for garbage pickup.

The program was started last May with tons of large items being removed. After the October drive ends, there will not be another pickup of large items until May.

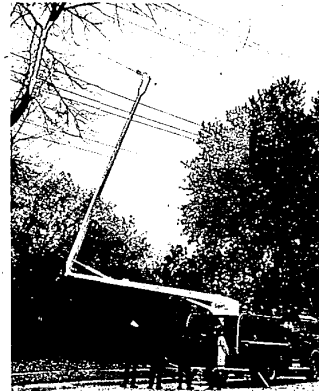

County Focuses On Drugs

FONTIAC The Oakland County Board of Supervisors has approved the establishment of a Drug Abuse Committee composed of citizens representing the medical and psychiatric professions, social workers, law enforcement agencies, judiciary, clergy, government officials and citizens at large.

The purpose of the Drug Abuse Committee will be to focus attention on the danger of the use of drugs by teenagers and adults, and to help marshal the community forces in an effective war of drug abuse through the media of educational programs and planning, that would ultimately provide for treatment facilities.

Other actions taken by the board were approval of remodeling contracts for the Administrative Annex Building, total \$26,000 which will house the Data Processing Department, Cooperative Extension Service and the Veterans Affairs Office.
