was a gathering of the clan too. It was hard to try home Sunday afternoon.

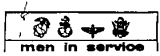
MANY IN Wood Creek remember the delightful dances we have gone to annually to raise money for the American Field Service.

FARMINGTON Beginning ballet for children four to six will be started at Farmington Community Center on Oct. 20 to accommodate kindergartners who could not be included in the 3:15 class. It will be held between 5:30 and 6:15 p.m. with a \$15 fee for 10 weeks.

Charm and good grooming will be taught beginning Oct. 21 from 4 to 5:30 p.m. for girls 10 years of age and older. Fee for the five-week session will be \$10. The class will cover such topics as hair care, make-up, modeling, social graces, general good grooming and self-improvement. Teacher for this course is Mrs. Barbara Macintosh, a Detroit fashion and photographic model. Mrs. Macintosh is a graduate of Marymount College and the Dale Carnegie Institute.
