Ms. Devlin, a Boston expatriot who now makes her home in the Cajun country of Opelousas, La., has created a going business from a rather ordi-nary idea. So going, in fact, that while she was at Jacobson's, buyers literally bught the clothes off her back.

she was at Jacobson's, buyers literally bugit the clothes off her back. Longtime traveler and compulsive fabric buyer, Ms. Devlin's husband one day yelled a loud 'Enough!' She started the business to appease him and make use of some luxurious, antique fabric bolts.

Close at hand was a marvelous resource—excellent seamstresses anxious to make a buck or two. Cajun momen are trained to sew as children by their grandmothers, and Opelousas and, until Ms. Devlin came along, few work opportunities for the women.

A cottage industry was formed quickly. Her first wenture was to take a half dozen or so dresses to Market Week in Dallas in 1976—the acceptance was instantaneous. Before she got back home, she was on the phone with her seamstresses arranging for a stock of orders to be filled.

BUT, CLOTHES, flowing tunic tops and cocktail dresses from elegant silks from China, India or Burma, are only part of the Devlin endeavor. Every scrap of lovely fabric is used—the smallest for coin purses and notebook covers, the largest to line a bed comfort in flowered, gold embroidered damask.

Ms. Devlin, a former model, does all the designing, and this year's loose styles are ideal for they require less exiting. Everything is hand made, something the seamstresses do beautifully, lust like the fine clothes of 100 years ago when the inside was almost as pretty as the outside.
