

Here's the choice at the top of the primary ballot

With 82 candidates for national, state and county-wide offices in the Observer & Eccentric area, here is a listing of who's running where and for what.

SIX DEMOCRATS are chasing their party's nomination for United States Senate. They are State Sen. Anthony Derzinski of Muskegon, former Detroit City Council President Carl Levin, State Sen. John Oleschaker of Grand Rapids, newspaper publisher Philip Power, State Rep. Paul Rosenbaum of Battle Creek and former Congressman Richard VanderVeet of Grand Rapids.

In the 18th District, which includes most of Troy, James Blanchard (D-Pleasant Ridge) is unopposed. Robert J. Saloum of Troy is the only candidate seeking the Republican nomination.

In the 19th District, which encompasses Birmingham, West Bloomfield, Bloomfield Hills and the lakes area, incumbent William Bloomfield (R-Birmingham) is unopposed in his party. Running for the Democratic nomination are Betty F. Collier of Drayton Plains and L.J. Peterson of Birmingham.

THREE STATE SENATE seats will be decided in November.

In the 8th District, which includes Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, West Bloomfield, Rochester and Avon Township, incumbent Donald Bishop (R-Rochester) is unopposed. Democrat William Blake of Troy is also unopposed.

In the 15th District, which includes Southfield, Farmington, Bloomfield Hills and Novi, incumbent Daniel Cooper (D-Southfield) faces former Michigan Citizens Lobby director Douglas Ross of Oak Park who is also unopposed for the Democratic nomination. Republican Markus S. Simon of Southfield has no opposition.

In the 16th District, which includes the southeast portion of Troy, State Rep. Kirby Holmes faces Eugene Tyza of Mt. Clemens for the GOP nomination.

In the 17th District, which includes Farmington and Southfield, Democratic incumbent William Broadhead of Detroit, will face no opposition in either the primary or general elections.

In the 21st District, which includes part of Southfield and Oak Park, Democratic incumbent Alex Perinoff of Southfield faces no party challenge. Republican candidate Stanley Shapiro of Southfield is unopposed.

In the 22nd District, which includes parts of Birmingham, Bloomfield Township and Beverly Hills, Republican incumbent Ralph Mazur, former County Board of Institutions member Marilyn E. Gosling of Bloomfield Hills, Democrat Richard Mills of Troy faces no primary opposition.

In the 14th District, which includes northern Troy and southeastern Avon Township, the primary pits incumbent Republican Henry W. Hoot of Bloomfield Township against Oakland County Board of Institutions member Marilyn E. Gosling of Bloomfield Hills. Democrat Richard Mills of Troy faces no primary opposition.

In the 15th District, which includes portions of Southfield, Farmington Hills, Bloomfield Township and all of Novi, incumbent Dennis Murphy (R-

Novi) and Martha L. Hoyer of Walled Lake square off a spot on the November ballot. Former county Commissioner Lew Coy is running alone for the Democratic nomination.

In the 71st District, which includes half of Troy, incumbent Sal Rocca (D-Sterling Heights) faces challenger Dave Pierce of Sterling Heights for the nomination. Republican candidate C. Douglas Cruce of Troy is unopposed.

ALL COUNTY COMMISSIONERS seats will be contested in the general election.

In the 6th District, which includes Rochester and a portion of Avon Township, incumbent Republican John Peterson of Rochester faces no primary opposition. Likewise, Democratic challenger Jack Huggson of Rochester is unopposed.

In the 13th District, which includes portions of Troy and Birmingham, incumbent Republican Robert Page of Birmingham is unopposed. Democrat Allen V. Anderlie of Troy, also faces no opposition for his party's nomination.

In the 14th District, which includes northern Troy and southeastern Avon Township, the primary pits incumbent Republican Henry W. 


