"In a January forum at Oakland Community College, we talked to single parents and their families about basic issues such as coping with lonliness and isolation."

As an outgrowth of that forum, Mrs. Bell said, nine committees were formed and SPACE was created with funds contributed by National Council of Jewish Women.

out and caring, Mrs. Bell said.

"Single parents are often cut off from their" Mrs. Bell said. "They're not all the types who go to bars or enroll in singles' dating services. Most of them don't want encounters in superficial settings. They'd rather meet and discuss and issue or participate in a project.

"Our program brings persons together to become involved in issues which builds better relationships. We're even planning a single parent family weekend retreat with dynamic programs for kids."

Widowed to Widowed is another pro-gram committee. The needs of wid-owed men and women are often differ-ent than for divorced parents. Mrs. Bell said. Many widows and widowers are learning to cope with the loss of a souces and the "empty nest" left by children who grow up and move away.

SISTER MARGARET Basso is training persons on the Widowed to Widowed committee in grief management, listening and outreach. Professionals in various fields are group facilitators. The SPACE newsletter advises single parents about what activities and agencies are available to them. It offersa column of services which can be exchanged such as writing skills for plumbing skills.

"We want to heighten single parents' awareness of what exists," Mrs. Bell said. "We help agencies and institutions fill in the holes and we fill in the holes ourselves. We re planning a crisis intervention hottine for persons who believe they've reached the end of their rope. This has never been tried before for single parents.


"Our social action advocacy committee was formed to heighten community awareness of the concerns of single parents. We'll be dealing with the Friend of the Court and other agencies. This definitely isn't a social program for singles. But it is a service which could lead to meaningful relationships.


