Mail to Israel gets deadline

The Israeli postal administration has set a number of deadlines for receiving mail that is to be delivered prior to the Jewish New Year, which will begin Oct. 2.

In order to assure delivery on time for the observance, all surface parcels should have been despatched in U.S. post offices by Aug. 14. Surface letters and cards should be mailed by Aug. 29; airmail parcels by Sept. 15 and airmail letters and cards no later than Sept. 21.

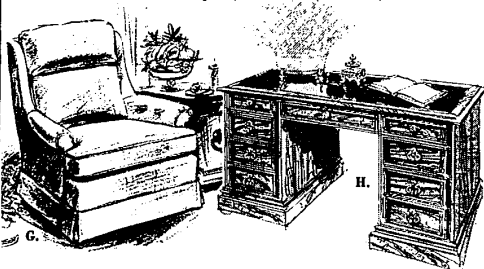

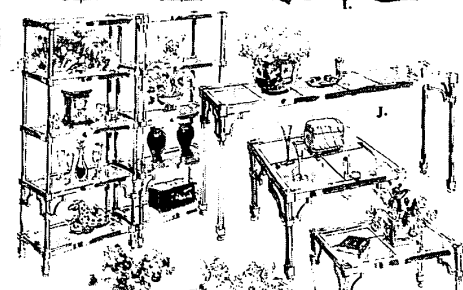
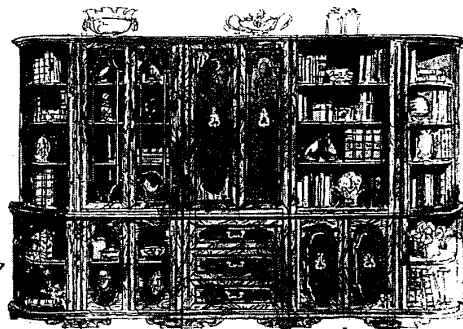
