Now, a team in its first varsity year, in what its supposed to be a very competitive league, should not be expected to do very well. But, the first-year Falcons are off to a fast start, as they have posted a 5-52 overall record and a 3-1-1 league mark.

While soccer is new to Farmington schools, it is not new to the Farmington area.
