At a recent meeting of the Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan, representatives from several fields outlined the changes coming as a result of environmental concerns, government regulation and simple

economics.

Some of those predictions include power lines and transformers at streetside rather than hidden at the rear, small condominium groups of 10-12 homes rather than the larger, more economically feasible developments and no single timber larger than a 2x4 in a house's framework,

A new Detroit Edison Co. policy, for example, calls for streetside location of power lines in all new subdivisions. Martin

Lorenz, manager of Edison's Macomb Division and director of its underground policy committee, said the change is important for the company, the consumer and the subdivision developer.

After seven years of working with underground power lines, Lorenz explains, the luster of their environmental benefits has been dimmed by economic realities relating largely to the way an affluent society uses its backyard. In short, the patio-pool-garden-privacy fence era has doomed the backyard power pedestal.

UNDERGROUND SERVICE has proven more costly to maintain than overhead lines because backyard improvements make it difficult and often impossible for Edison (Continued on page 8)


