Diabetes detection tests given Nov. 6-10

Free testing for diabetes will be available during National Diabetes Detection Week from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. Monday through Friday in Botsford General Hospital, 20050 Grand River. The testing program is sponsored by American Diabetes Association-Michigan Affiliate in programitical middle.

igan Affiliate in cooperation with 150 hospitals and health facilities in the

state. Diabetes is a disease that impairs

the ability of the body to use sugar. Insulin is needed to convert the starches and sugars into energy. Diabetes is diagnosed through blood sugar tests. It is estimated that there are about 20,000 undiagnosed cases of diabetes in Michigan. The purpose of the drive is to identify these people and alert them to the need for proper treatment. In 1977 the detection week program found 571 persons who didn't know

they had the disease.

THE MOST common symptoms of diabetes are excessive thirst, frequent urination, blurring vision, constant hunger, or the slow healing of cuts and scratches. The disease, however, may be pre-

sent without any of these symptons.

Persons who are over 35, overweight, and blood relatives of a diabetic are particularly urged to take

the test since they are in the high rish group and are most likely to develop diabetes.

To assure an accurate test, it is important to eat a high carboylarate meal, one with a large amount of starctes and sugars, about two hours before the test.

The testing is limited to those over 3 years of age who have not pre-ously been diagnosed as diabetic.
