Now men face up to a facial

Once men became regular customers of female beauty salons, they discovered the facial.

"Gone are the days of having separate compartments for men and women. Gone are the special days and special hours for men," said Southfield aesthetician Mira Linder.

"Now that my men customers know what a facial is and what it does, I've had to double up on ordering a whole new batch of products," she said.

Between 15-20 men are regular customers at the salon, 23563 Northwestern. Some started patronizing the salon for hair treatments, some for massages.

One male customer, a professional hockey player, came to have hot wax treatments on his shins, because without the excess hair, it made taping less painful. He stayed for a massage; then a facial.

THE REASON for a facial is simply good skin care, Ms. Linder said. It improves blood circulation and gets the face "squeaky clean."

One customer, a newsman, quipped to Ms. Linder that his face felt so clean he thought his nose was going to fall off his face.

The 50-minute bit of pampering from

the shoulders up begins in a relaxed position while a European-trained aesthetician drains away tensions and teeth-clenching lines with soft hands and soothing sryups. Meanwhile, Ms. Linder is making a chart of the client's face, marking the oily and dry patches.

The skin is cleansed and rubbed with a toner. A light peeling solution is applied which causes dead skin to fall away like crumbs.

Next comes a massage with creams, gels and bacteria-killing steam, while shoulders are massaged for about 15 minutes. Then blackheads, whiteheads or whatever are gently popped.

A decongesting solution opens pores and gets rid of whatever grit is left. The face is brushed with a high-frequency vibrating wand, killing bacteria and improving the blood circulation. It feels somewhat like needles and pins.

THE TREATMENT includes seven minutes of warm compresses under what looks like a hockey mask. When this is removed, more liquids are applied, either to dry out oily skin or remedy dry skin.

And you are not finished yet. Another mask is applied, this time with a coating of creams, depending on your skin problems.

When that mask is wiped off, a protective cream is slathered on. Now your skin tingles.

One male customer summed it up by saying, "Even the breeze against your cheek has a new meaning."

pleting her studies at the Henry Ford Hospital school of radiology. Her fiancé is a student at the Cleveland School of Podiatry.


