

Schwartz to be honored with Bnai Brith award

Attorney Alan E. Schwartz will be honored by Bnai Brith on Thursday, Nov. 16, for "distinguished and enduring contributions of a humanitarian nature."

The past president of the Jewish Welfare Federation of Detroit will receive an award at the organization's 1978 International Humanitarian Award Dinner, in the Fairlane Manor, Dearborn.

Named general dinner chairmen were Martin E. Citrin, David K. Easlick, Joseph L. Hudson, Jr., and William G. Meese.

Schwartz is currently Jewish Welfare Federation director and is president of the United Foundation, chairman of the board of Oakland University, vice-president of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, and a director of the March of Dimes, Detroit Renaissance Inc., the Economic Club of Detroit, the Michigan Cancer Foundation, and the Cranbrook School.

Citrin, partner in J.A. Citrin Sons Co., is currently president of the Detroit Jewish Welfare Federation, and a member of the board of direc-

tors of both Sinai Hospital and the United Foundation.

Easlick, a past recipient of the humanitarian award, is president of Michigan Bell Telephone Co.

Hudson, chairman of the department store chain, was the first Detroit recipient of the humanitarian award in 1970. Meese is chairman of Detroit Edison, and last year's humanitarian award recipient.

Proceeds from the \$125-a-plate dinner will support one of the largest youth serving programs in America, encompassing Bnai Brith Hillel Foundations on over three hundred campuses, including Wayne State University, Michigan State University, and the University of Michigan.

The Bnai Brith youth organization, and the Bnai Brith career and counseling service also will benefit.

Bnai Brith is the oldest and largest Jewish service organization.

Art auction set to renovate house

"You gotta have art" seems to be the theme song of local amateur and professional artists as they prepare for Saturday's annual fine arts auction, sponsored by the Wayne-Westland Art Association.

The auction will be at the new Melvin C. Bailey Recreation Center, behind the Westland City Hall, on Ford Road between Wayne and Newburgh. Proceeds from the auction will be used to renovate a 16-year-old Greek Revival House, formerly located in Canton Township, the house has been relocated on a temporary site in Westland for use as a community center for the arts.

Members of the arts association financed the \$15,000 move with personal loans and contributions, saving the house from being bulldozed to make room for a new entertainment center.

At one time the house was part of the underground railroad that brought southern slaves to freedom in the north. It also took in wounded during the Civil War.

The art association will also sell stationery, featuring reproductions of the original pen and ink sketch of the revival house by Westland artist Sandra Weed. Proceeds from the sale will be used to help with the renovation.

Mrs. Weed, whose paintings are featured in shows throughout the metropolitan area, is one of many artists who have donated original art pieces for the auction.

Other featured artists will be Janet Burt, Sue Rothamel, Palmer Brown and Jeff Johnson.

Johnson, a 20-year-old Royal Oak resident who is in the process of relocating to Birmingham, is a silversmith and goldsmith. He is donating rings, necklaces and bracelets for the auction.

Johnson started working with fossils and stones as a hobby at the age of 14. He later took private lessons and attended night school at Cranbrook. His hobby now has become an occupation.

Auction preview begins at 7 p.m. and refreshments will be served until the auction begins at 8 p.m. Admission is free, and the auction is open to the public.

Top flutist to visit area

Detroit area music lovers are in for a treat thanks to the efforts of the newly formed Detroit Flute Association.

Wendy Hommeyer, president of the one-month old group that already has 60 members, invited English flutist William Bennett to Detroit to give a master class and a concert while he is touring the states. Bennett will be in Michigan to give concerts in Ann Arbor and Lansing.

The solo flutist will perform at 8 p.m. Monday, Nov. 13, at Orchestra Hall in Detroit. Tickets at \$5 each are available at Flute Center, USA, 1514 N. Woodward, Royal Oak; Orchestra

Hall, 3711 Woodward, Detroit and J.L. Hudson's ticket offices.

On Sunday evening, Nov. 12, Bennett will teach a master class in Dearborn for 100 flutists. Local performers have been chosen to demonstrate for Bennett's closed class. The performers are Mary Scudder of Avon Township, Lana Ordman of Belleville, Carol Perkins of Madison Heights and Rosemary Pilling.

Bennett is touring the country as flutist with English Chamber Orchestra. Known as a leading exponent of the French style of flute playing, he has won every coveted scholarship and medal in international flute

competition.

He has played solo flute with every major British orchestra and now devotes his performing for solo work.

The former principal flutist for the London Symphony and London Philharmonic does solo flute recordings with English Chamber Orchestra and with Academy of St. Martin-in-the-Field, under the direction of Neville Marriner, who will be the music director at Meadow Brook Music Festival in 1979.

Accompanying Bennett for his Detroit performance will be Anthony Habstead, principal hornist for English Chamber Orchestra.



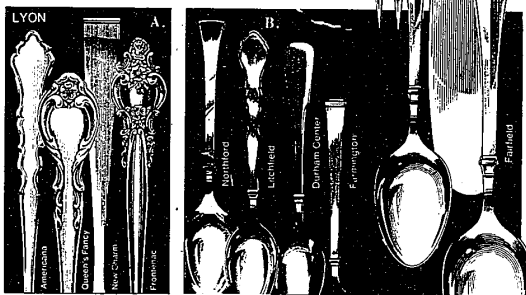
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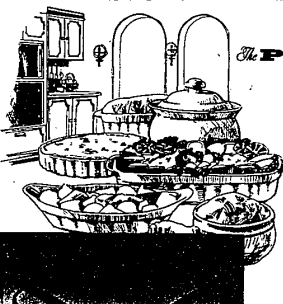
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
