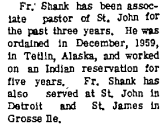


Institution Of Rector Is Oct. 30

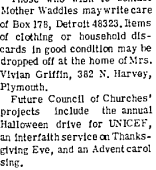

Hadassah Sets Show For Aliyah

Bozo the Clown and Mr. Whoozle and The Fatoum Man will share the bill at the Nov. 2 fund raising show for Youth Aliyah.

The Ann Arbor Chapter of Hadassah is sponsoring the show beginning at 8 p.m. in the auditorium of Ann Arbor Pioneer High School.

Youth Aliyah was founded in 1934 to save a generation of Jewish children from Nazis in Europe. Since then the organization has helped resettle, rehabilitate and educate in Israel, nearly 135,000 Jewish Youth from 60 lands.

Catholic Archdiocese Makes \$125,000 Grants To Help Poor Self-Help

Grants totaling \$125,000 and seeking to help break the poverty cycle in the inner-city areas have been authorized by John Cardinal Dearden, Archbishop of Detroit.

The money, from a special \$1 million Archdiocesan Development Fund collection in May 1968, raised the amount so far expended to \$728,542, spread over 27 projects. Meanwhile an appropriations committee made up of inner-city residents will continue to examine projects and make recommendations for the use of money not yet expended.

The new decrees will be ordered after completion of the two-year curriculum to work on the parish level of the Catholic Church. 'Call To Prayer' Set In Plymouth

The Women's Society of Christian Service of the First Methodist Church of Plymouth will host a Quiet Day Breakfast at 9:30 a.m., Wednesday, Oct. 29, in the church located at 680 Church St. The meeting will consider a "Call to Prayer and Self-Denial."

THE ACTIONS taken:

- A grant of \$20,649 to Harbinger, Inc., of Oakland County to continue helping the black and Spanish-speaking people of Oakland County achieve additional progress in the field of self-determination. In October 1968, a grant of \$64,430 was made to the organization, whose name is a Swahili word meaning "Let us work together."
- A grant of \$2,808 to the Detroit Geographical Expedition. The sum will pay tuition for 26 students studying "Geography 469: Urban Field Methods," a four-hour credit course at the Metropolitan Extension Center of the University of Michigan Extension Service.

- The object is to provide to inner-city black students the techniques of (1) dictating various areas to achieve political goals, (2) designing a transportation system to serve inner-city needs, and (3) establishing facts on money flow within the inner-city—finding out in particular the amount taken from slums through legal and illegal methods.
- A grant of \$25,000 to the Positive Neighborhood Action Committee, headed by Mrs. Annie Watkins and concerned with an area bounded by Dequindre, Frederick, Mt. Elliott and Grotto.

The money will help provide staff help for a group of citizens who in the summer of 1968 banded together to fight against the causes of racial tension, which they saw reaching an alarming state. Since then regular meetings have held at which many persons have stated problems suitable for group action, particularly in the fields of education, recreation, sanitation, police-community relations, social services, housing and employment.

• A grant of \$2,250 to the Inner-City Voter Registration Council, promoters of a massive registration drive to educate unregistered black citizens to their responsibilities and to encourage black and white voters to see the need for further participation of the black community representatives in policy-making through action within the established representative system of government.

Mooney Council Sets Communion

The Knights of Columbus men of Edward Cardinal Mooney Council 3577, will serve corporate communion at 11:30 a.m. Sunday, Oct. 26 in St. John Seminary, Plymouth.

Dinner will follow at 12:30 p.m. The corporate communion will be for Knights of Colum-

bus members only. The celebrant of the divine liturgy will be the Rev. David Natsopoulos, and the liturgy will commemorate Edward Cardinal Mooney on the anniversary of his death.

Ted Urauro, 538-7459, will accept reservations.

The local organization, headed by Mrs. Joyce Ashford, stresses short range goals of jobs, adequate incomes and dignity and long range goals involving self-help training to break the cycle of dependency on welfare agencies. The group fights to improve housing, and price gouging, and bring humanity to operation of bureaucracies.

The paper is designed to give the area a mouthpiece for bartering community needs, for providing reports on attacks on community programs, for stimulating interest in social action and for encouraging self-determination for black communities.

• A grant of \$14,000 to "The Ghetto Speaks", a bi-monthly newspaper published by the Eastside Voice of Independent Detroit (EVID), 10633 Mack, to provide a voice and new channel for black people at the grass roots level.

• A grant of \$8,000 to the University of Detroit Urban Extension Program, offering classes in Afro-American history, literature and theater to inner-city residents and particularly to those previously uninterested in college. Facilities will be located within the inner-city community, but under university supervision so that matriculation at an institution of higher learning may be arranged eventually for those desiring to complete college.

Recruiting of accredited teachers and the setting up normal college schedules will be the responsibility of the Sankore Society, a group of black teachers who came together in 1958 to seek to give a new dimension to the teaching of black children and youths.

• A grant of \$5,200 to the Friends of the Farm Workers, a Michigan group organized to make effective a boycott of California table grapes as a means of gaining fair wages and working conditions for West Coast agricultural workers.

The grant will provide substantial living, at \$50 a week, to organizers who will spend full time working to bring the facts of west coast labor conditions directly to consumers. Their efforts are meant to counter a huge public relations
