

Catholic Archdiocese Makes \$125,000 Grants To Help Poor Self-Help

Grants totaling \$125,000 and seeking to help break the pov-erty cycle in nine different areas have been authorized by John Cardinal Dearden, Arch-bishop of Detroit.

The money, from a special 51 million Archidocasan Development Fund collection in May 1968, raised the amount so far expended to 5785,542, spread over 27 projects, Meanwhile an appropriation committee made up of inner-city residents will continue to examine projects and make recommendations for the use of money not yet expended.

Grants will help finance training of black experts on Detroit geography, a program seeking justice for farm work-ers, a black cultural project, ers, a black cultural project, a ghetto newspaper, two groups concerned with particular areas of the inner city, a citizenship activity drive, a weifare rights federation, and a Pontiac experiment in self-heip activities.
