The Rev. Walter Ziemba, founder of the Center for Polish Studies and Culture at Orchard Lake, wants the estimated 400,000 Polish Americans in the Detroit area to search their attics and basements for anything their parents or grandparents brought from Poland. The center is interested in books, especially prayer books, holy pictures, newspaper clippings, crucifixes, and letters.

It may look like junk to you, but to Pr. Zlemba It is a precious link to a storied past and an ancient fath. He would like to add it to the collection of memorabilia at Orchard Lake.

"The older Polish immigrant is now in his 780 or 80s, "says Fr. Zlemba. "His children or grandchildren are in command of his bequests, whatever he brought from the old country. Many of these things now lie discarded and forgotten somewhere in a basement, an attic, or a closet."
