rehabilitation program for women offenders. TASC is an employment training program.

The group is composed of more than 8,000 volunteers and professionals which participates with other civic, church and community organizations toward rebuilding lives and neighborhoods.

The International Order of Job's Daughters is a philanthropic organization for girls between the ages of 11 and 20 who are related to Master Masons.

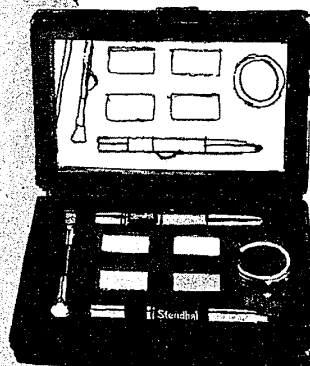
Spectrum Gallery displays pottery
