Milliken free to veto anti-abortion bill

Funding package is separated

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Michigan's Medicaid services will go
uninterrupted and Gow. William Milliken is again free to veto the state legistature's decision to stop funding
state-financed abortions.

A delicately maneuvered compromise enabled legislators to contions and state funding for the

The house of representatives approved the funding bill, 59-34, and the anti-abortion policy bill, 61-27.

Area representatives voting for the Medicaid appropriation were Jack Kirksey (R-Livonia), James Defebaugh (R-Birmingham), Joseph Forbes (D-Oak Park), Richard Fes-



ster (R-Union Lake) and Sal Rocca (D-Sterling Heights). Those voting against the funding bill included Reps. Thomas Brown (D-Garden Gity), Robert Law (R-Livonia) and Roy Smith (R-Vpsilanti). Not voting were John Bennett (D-Redford), Wilber Brotherton (R-Farmington) and Ruth McNamee (R-Birmingham).


three area representatives voted "no."—Defebaugh, Forbes and McNamee.

IN THE SENATE chambers, the members of the upper house approved the appropriations bill, 28-3, and the anti-abortion bill, 21-5.

Three area senators—Donald Bishop (R-Rochester), William Faust (D-Westland) and Robert Geake (R-Northville)—voted for the \$20 million Medicaid appropriation. Sens. Daniel Cooper (D-Oak Park) and Bill Huffman (D-Madison Heights) did not vote.

Bishop, Huffman and Geake voted for the anti-abortion bill. Cooper opposed it and Faust was absent.

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


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
