Scott Pritchett, Lahser's 67 center, put the Knights ahead with two free throws, 769, after barely missing a slam dunk and an opportunity for a three-point play.

Lahser had a time-out left after Walsh's jumper, but Lahser coach Nick Conti agreed with his team's strategy to get the ball up the floor in a hurry


