

Bookworms have a busy library schedule

The New Year promises a variety of children's programs to brighten the days for all ages of children at the Farmington Community Library. Both branches of the library will offer many programs to bring literature and media to life with library materials integrated along with learning and fun activities.

Registration for this five week series of programs, Jan. 22-Feb. 23, will begin from 9-11 a.m., Jan. 12. Regis-

tration must be made in person by a parent who must show their library card to confirm their registration. After 11 a.m. registration may be made in person or by telephone. In all programs a child may register for only one program but may attend many open programs. If a second program is desired, the child's name will be placed on a waiting list. Children who live or go to school in Farmington or Farmington Hills will be given first

preference. Other residents may place their children's names on waiting lists or they may be contacted towards the conclusion of the registration period.

The Farmington branch will be offering several new programs for preschoolers. "A Tisket a Tasket," a Storytellers Basket, "from 10:30-11 a.m. on Mondays from Jan. 22-Feb. 19 will be led by Jill Locke.

AN UNUSUAL story hour for four and five-year-olds will focus on simple concepts in "Science for Tots." Denise Albrecht will present this one Mondays from 2:20-3 p.m. with a \$1 fee for materials. A special cool cooking program, "Stone Soup," will be using pre-reading skills in cooking on Wednesdays from 2:20-3 p.m. Barb Brower will be leading this program which has a materials fee of \$1. Along with one of these three programs, a pre-schooler may attend "Mickey Mouse's Birthday Party" with Denise Albrecht on one of three dates: Jan. 23, Feb. 5 or Feb. 20.

First and second graders can enjoy "The Beat Goes On," a music exploration program by Jill Locke on Thursdays from 4:45 p.m. Third and fourth graders can encounter a "Monster Mash" of monster activities presented by Denise Albrecht for five monster meetings on Wednesdays from 4:45 p.m. A \$2 materials fee is due at registration.

"South of the Border" and "International Cookery" are each two-week sessions especially for fifth and sixth graders in honor of 1979 as "International Year of the Child." They will meet on Tuesdays from 4:45 p.m. with materials fees required. Again, "Reader's Roundtable" invites fifth and sixth graders for activities and informal discussions of books on the first and third Mondays, 4:45 p.m.

Open programs at the Farmington branch don't require any pre-registra-

tion for children. They may just attend.

PRE-SCHOOLERS may attend "South of the Border" for pinata fun in Mexico from 2:20-3 p.m., Jan. 23. "My Favorites," from 10:30-11 a.m. on Feb. 9 invites pre-schoolers to attend with a parent and bring a favorite thing from home.

"A Beastly Time" with a film, animal art and board game will be presented on Jan. 20 for elementary school aged children.

The Farmington Hills branch will offer various pre-school programs which require registration. Two sessions of "A Tisket, a Tasket, a Storyteller's Basket," for three and four year-olds will be held from 10:10-10:30 a.m. on Wednesdays led by Denise Moll and from 2:20-3 p.m. on Tuesdays with Barb Shumer. "Start with Art" is for four and five-year-olds featuring stories and art led by Denise Moll from 2:20-3 p.m. on Thursdays. A science story hour, "Science for Tots," will be presented by Phyllis Alpert from 9:30-10 a.m. on Mondays.

Barb Shumer will direct "The Beat Goes On with Music," for four and five-year-olds from 10:30-11 a.m. on Tuesdays. Pre-schoolers can register for one "Mickey Mouse Special" conducted on Jan. 24, Jan. 31, Feb. 6 or Feb. 13, led by Phyllis Alpert.

"Stone Soup" is a cool cooking course for first and second graders from 4:45 p.m. on Mondays, with a \$5

materials fee. The course is presented by Barb Shumer.

THIRD AND FOURTH graders can become writers in training in the program of the same name from 4:45 p.m. on Thursdays. The program is directed by Barb Shumer. "Show Me Your Song" will involve fifth and sixth graders in a slide show with eight meetings from Jan. 24-March 28. Meetings will be from 4:45 p.m. Denise Moll will present the program which has a \$1.50 materials charge.

"Readers Roundtable" invited fifth and sixth graders to meet on the first and third Tuesdays 4:15-5:15 p.m. with Barb Shumer and Denise Moll.

For first through sixth graders an "Italian Language Class" will be conducted in two sessions: 11 a.m.-noon on Saturdays or from noon-1 p.m. on Saturdays. Details are available at the library.

Open programs for pre-schoolers at the Farmington Hills branch include "Films and Fun" from 10:30-11 a.m. on Jan. 18. "Magic Musings" will be conducted from 2:20-3 p.m., Feb. 5.

School-aged children may attend a funny film about Mr. Magoo from 2:30 p.m., Jan. 13 and "Hunted in Holland" from 2:30 p.m. on Jan. 27.

ON JAN. 10 from 7:30-8 p.m., the Farmington Library will present a session on basic library services. From 7:30-8 p.m., on Jan. 25, the Farmington Hills Library will present a special topic session on using business sources which will concentrate on the use of business and investment information.

The adult book discussion group will continue to meet this year, beginning with the thought provoking titles "Hiroshima" by John Hersey on Jan. 11 and Nancy Friday's "My Mother, My Self" on Jan. 25. The group meets from 10 a.m. to noon.

Beginning Jan. 12 registration will be accepted for our storytelling workshop geared for adults who work with children. The four-week program will meet from 7:30-9 p.m. on Mondays beginning Jan. 22 at the Farmington Hills Library. The sessions will feature advice on choosing stories, learning stories, using media with stories and will culminate with participants telling stories to the group.
