143 participate in tourney

Long matches highlight Franklin event

Long, grueling matches highlighted the final round of play in the first-ever Holiday Tennis Classic played last Saturday at the Franklin Racquet Club.

Over 143 players participated in the 16 divisions of play during the four-day tourney.

One of the longest matches in the tourney was played Saturday afternoon in the men's A final between Tom Har-

rett, club champion at Centaur and John Lindsey, a member of Franklin.

The two players battled over two hours before the match was decided.

Lindsey, running from sideline to sideline, outlasted Harrett, 6-3, 3-6, 7-5, in one of the most exciting matches of the day.

Lindsey's top spin groundstrokes were a sharp contrast to Harrett's

power game. Both players extended themselves to the limit during the marathon battle.

In the women's A doubles final, Sue Heald and Diane Mehas outlasted Anita Goldman and Laurie Kaufman, 6-7, 6-4, 7-6.

Goldman and Kaufman frustrated their opponents the first set by hitting a variety of lobs and winners.

Mehas and Heald got going in the second set using their power serve and volley strategy.

GOLDMAN and KAUFMAN took a 5-4 lead in the final set only to lose service in the 10th game which got their opponents back into contention. Mehas and Heald won the tiebreaker easily, 5-0.

The longest match of the day occurred in the women's B final between Sally Gerak and Sampa Dutton. The three-hour match finally ended when Dutton won the tiebreaker in the third set, 7-6. Gerak had won the first set, 6-3, but lost another tiebreaker in the second, 6-7.

Gerak said she tired in the last set against the younger Dutton.

In the men's A doubles final, Fred Jones and Brian Beal defeated Lindsey and Chuck Imhoff, 7-6, 7-6, 6-2, in a match which lasted for almost two hours.

In the men's open final, Mark Conti, former Big Ten Singles champion at Michigan defeated John Neville, 7-6, 6-0, for the title. The 20-year-old Neville, a student at the University of Pennsil-

vania, led Conti 5-2 in the first set, only to lose in a tiebreaker.

"It took me a while to get going since I haven't been playing that much," said Conti.

The more-experienced Conti then made quick work of Neville in the second set, whipping the youngster, 6-0, in just 20 minutes.

Both players displayed some fine passing shots in the first set as the two finalists rallied from baseline to baseline.

HARRY MEYER used his vast experience to defeat David MacLeod, 6-2, 7-5, in the men's C championship. Meyer displayed his ambidexterity with his ground strokes in beating the more youthful MacLeod.

Hildy Randolph captured the women's A singles final by downing Hillary Gilstein, 6-0, 6-4.

A Christmas surprise

Swim star gets national rank

Doug Cleland and his friend walked out of the Oakland University locker room one day last week after another grueling, two-hour swim practice.

The two swimmers were entranced by a musical game of computer basketball.

Although he probably would have preferred playing with the little singing box, Cleland politely waved his friend to the lobby and consented to an interview.

Swimming is now a major priority in the skyrocketing life of Rochester's 13-year-old swimming celebrity. Computer games are now taking a second place — so to speak — in Cleland's maturing career.

His years of hard work were rewarded last month as Cleland was ranked as the third best all-around (11-12 years) age-group swimmer in the country. He was lauded as an "age-group star" of 1978 in the December issue of "Swimming World" magazine.

"I was told last May that I was going to be ranked, but it wasn't official until the magazine came out in December," said Cleland, who attends West Junior High School. "To be ranked third among all the swimmers in the nation was my biggest Christmas present."

Cleland accomplished that tremendous ranking with a phenomenal 1978 outdoor (commonly referred to as

long-course meets and measured in meters) and indoor (short-course, measured in yards) swim season.

His most prestigious feat was shattering the 11-12-year-old 50-yard backstroke national record with a time of :27.40. It was one of 123 age-group records which were broken by swimmers across the country last year.

CLELAND WAS subsequently ranked as the top individual indoor backstroke in the nation for 1978.

Other national short-course individual rankings for Cleland were second place in the 100-yard backstroke (:59.67), 100-yard individual medley (:59.86) and 200-yard individual medley (2:10.67). He was also listed among the top 10 national swimmers in six of the remaining eight individual indoor events.

The listings are just as impressive in the long-course categories.

Cleland was second in both the 50-meter backstroke (:31.11) and 50-meter butterfly (:29.83). He was ranked third in the 50-meter freestyle, 100-meter backstroke and 200-meter individual medley.

His Michigan records are numerous. Cleland owns eight state short-course records, and seven state long-course records. At the Michigan AAU meet last summer he won all nine events in which he entered.

Cleland competes as a member of the Oakland Live Yers — Rochester's combined AAU, YMCA and Oakland University age-group swim team. He has been swimming since he was

seven years old.

"We were just driving by Heart of the Hills Swim Club (Old Perch Road and Avon Road) one day, and my mother suggested that I join the club," said Cleland, whose mother and grandmother both have competitive swimming experience. "I got interested in swimming then, and joined the club."

SINCE THEN the seventh grade student has steadily improved.

Cleland's days normally consist of two-hour workouts at the Oakland University — the Live Yers' home. Three days a week are devoted to lifting weights, a program Cleland started late last year.

He has competed in swim meets all over Michigan, and has travelled to Cincinnati and Nashville.

"I have a goal right now of getting a scholarship to a major college," said Cleland. "Whatever happens after that — like the Olympics or an NCAA championship — will be extra."

Another Rochester swimmer — Jim Bruzese — is ranked nationally in two individual events. Bruzese is seventh (one notch ahead of Cleland) in the 100-yard breaststroke, and 10th in the 100-yard individual medley.

The top-ranked swimmers overall for 1978, according to "Swimming World," are Sam McAdam for the boys and Tracy Caulkins, who was featured in an article by "Sports Illustrated" last year, for the girls.

The second-ranked boy was Jim Bodine, followed by Cleland.
