

Rice beats Borgess for 13th straight win

Birmingham Brother Rice, the state's number one ranked team in Class A, outscored Redford Township Bishop Borgess 29-17 in the first quarter and went on to post their 13th straight victory, 82-60, in a Central Division Catholic League game Friday.

Rice, 13-0 overall and 7-0 in league play, got 18 points from Tim Andrew, 13 from George Duncan, 12 from Steve Amell and 10 from Rob Manilla.

Rice played without starting point guard Mike Dietz who was out because of a back injury.

Senior Bruno Petrella however picked up the slack in a starting role by netting nine points and passing off for eight assists. He scored seven of his points in the first quarter.

Andrew grabbed 19 rebounds while 6-5 junior forward Rob Manilla had 10.

Rice hit 31 of 59 shots from the field for 52 per cent. Borgess hit 24 of 63 shots for 38 per cent.

The Warriors outbounded Borgess, 40-28.

Brother Rice travels to Detroit DeLaSalle, Friday in a league battle.

BLOOMFIELD HILLS LAHSER went without starting guard Tim Wynn but still managed to beat Naples Troy Athens, 85-44, in a Metro Suburban Activities Association game Friday.

Wynn sat out the game with a torn rib cartilage.

"It's hard to say how long Tim will be out," said Lahser coach Nick Conti. "He was sore and we thought it was best for him to not play."

Kevin Munson, a junior, started in place of Wynn and scored 12 points.

Lahser forward Shawn Santa led all scorers with 16 points. Other Lahser players in double figures were Rob Foster (12), Scott Pritchett (12) and David Rosenfield (11). Pritchett ruled the boards with 13 rebounds.

Lahser hit 32 of 56 shots from the floor for 57 per cent.

The Knights, 11-1 overall and 6-0 in league play, host Rochester Adams Friday.

Troy Athens' top scorer against the highly-ranked Knights was Jerry Haggerty (15).

Lahser led at halftime, 39-21, and outscored Athens, 25-7, in the final period.

LUTHERAN EAST raised its record to 9-4 overall and 7-2 in the Metro Conference with a 79-66 victory over Bloomfield Hills Cranbrook Friday.

Phil Bouknight, a 6-6 power center for East, led all scorers with 24 points. Pete Thomas, a 6-6 forward, added 8 points.

Cranbrook trailed 33-32 at halftime but couldn't cope with East's distinct size advantage on the boards.

Cranbrook slipped to 4-7 overall and 3-5 in the Metro Conference.

"They are a big team and just wore

us down," said Cranbrook coach Dan Hazen.

"We ran well in the first half but just ran out of gas," he said.

Cranbrook turned the ball over 41 times. Lutheran East committed 22.

Cranbrook, despite the height disadvantage, won the battle on the boards, 38-33.

Senior captain Don Meier, playing well of late, led the Flames with 18 points and 14 rebounds, hitting eight of 14 shots from the floor.

Cranbrook travels to Grosse Pointe University-Liggett Thursday.

BIRMINGHAM SEAHOLM dropped its 10th game in 11 starts as the Berkeley Bears pounded the Maples, 88-58, in a Southeastern Michigan Association game.

Gary Long led the 1-10 Maples with 12 points. Paul Johnson added nine. Seaholm travels to Farmington-Harri-son Tuesday.

BLOOMFIELD HILLS ROEPER blew a 19-point first half lead but man-

aged to hang on to defeat a stubborn Roseville Baptist quintet, 56-53, Friday afternoon.

All-purpose forward John Jones scored two key baskets for Reoper late in the game to hold off a charging Roseville squad.

Jones, a senior, led all scorers with 19 points. Bob Lutz was high for Roseville with 18.

Reoper coach Dave McDonald got

unexpected help from senior reserve Steve Rich who came off the bench to score 10 points. Center Carlos Goodman had 12 points also for the Roughriders.

Reoper, 7-3 overall, played without regulars Frank Skorina and Chris Moore. The Roughriders will be in action again, Tuesday Feb. 6, away against Hamtramck Immaculate Conception.

Kevin Judd, a 17-year-old whose bowling is confined to the junior leagues, turned in one of the most amazing performances of the current season when posted a 720 series in the Youth League at Westland Bowl.

On the way to this big feat he had a string of 15 straight strikes and the manner in which he went about piling up his score left some of the old timers agast.

Carrying a 188 average, Judd rolled an opening game of 190 that included a string of five strikes at the finish. Coming right back, he opened the second game with 10 in a row for a 288 game and then eight more strikes in the third game for a 242 and the 720 series.

Only one other 700 series was bowled in the area during the week and that, too, came at Westland Bowl where Rick Clark bowled in the junior house league, had games of 242, 255 and 257 for a 755.

Not to be outdone, the women also turned in some fine bowling at Westland. Showing the way was Carol Post, a 173 average bowler, who fashioned a 618 that included a 288 finishing game.

She ran up a string of nine strikes before leaving up the 5-8 split. She spared and then struck out to beat Ellie Hill by a margin of only three pins.

While Clark was rolling his big series in the junior house league, there was a stirring battle for second place. Alex Brown

finally landed it with a 655, one pin more than Frank Mugger, Bob Szostak landed third with a 258 in 648.

WHILE THERE were no 700 series bowled at Wonderland the sharpshooters set something of a record in the classic when 45 of them bettered double century figures.

Jim Large set the pace when he missed the 700 goal by two pins and Jim Shelp was right behind with a 684.

On the women's side Chris Fischer showed the way with a 233 in 614. Jane Martin took over second place in the firing with a 611 and two others—Polly Cole and Peggy Mc Kinley—tied for third at 604.
