

DeLaSalle upsets Brother Rice cagers

How can a team hit a school record 30 of 40 shots from the floor and still lose?

That's the question Birmingham Brother Rice coach Bill Norton must be asking himself after Detroit DeLaSalle pulled off the biggest upset of the 1978 basketball season Tuesday night, 68-46.

Using a tight man-to-man defense, DeLaSalle hit 10 of 13 free throws in the fourth period for the upset win against the state's number one Class A team.

Rice led 50-48 going into the final period but then lost 6-10 senior center Tim Andree to five personal fouls with 4:12 to go. Then Rice forward George Duncan fouled out as DeLaSalle paraded to the foul line in their own cramped gymnasium.

Rice, despite hitting a record percentage from the floor, committed 23 turnovers and hit just six of 16 free throws.

Andree, who scored 28 points and grabbed 10 rebounds, missed all five attempts from the line.

Rob Manilla, Rice's third leading scorer and second leading rebounder, had an off night scoring just four points and grabbing eight rebounds. Jim McGill led DeLaSalle with 19 points. Scott Newman had 11 and Emmanuel Davis added 12.

DeLaSalle took advantage of Rice fouls by canning 20 of 27 free throws. McGill hit nine of 10.

Duncan, who hit all six field goal attempts in the first half, could not get his hands on the ball in the second half and was limited to just one shot.

Rice, which averages 57 shots game, shot 20 per cent better from the floor but took 17 less attempts.

The Warriors, almost certain to fall from their number one ranking, are 13-1 overall and 7-1 in the First Division of the Catholic League.

The Rice cagers host Harper Woods Notre Dame Friday.

DETROIT COUNTRY DAY outscored highly-touted Hamtramck 36-26

in the second half but still came up short, 64-58, Tuesday night in a Metro Conference game.

With the loss, the Yellow Jackets are 6-5 overall and 3-3 in the Metro Conference. Hamtramck leads the league with an 8-0 mark.

Hamtramck, ranked eighth in Class C, jumped out to a commanding 38-22 halftime lead.

Country Day made it close in the second half using a half-court press and

combination defenses.

"We were a little intimidated in the first half, but overall our shooting has improved," said Country Day coach Kurt Keener.

The Yellow Jackets hit 23 of 46 shots from the floor for 50 per cent.

Rodney Gilbert led Country Day in scoring with 26 points, 16 coming in the second half.

Bob MacKenzie, a 6-5 center, came off the bench to score 20 points for

Country Day.

Guard Bob Jones led the Cosmos with 25. Glen Montgomery added 19 points.

Country Day hosts Harper Woods Friday.

FARMINGTON HARRISON won its fourth game of the season by defeating Birmingham Seaholm, 62-52, in a non-league encounter Tuesday.

The Maples, 1-1 overall, were led by

Andy Sovran who netted 19 points. Dave Keller and Ed Williams added nine each for the losers.

Junior forward Brian Burgess paced Harrison (4-9) with 23.

Seaholm enjoyed a 29-26 halftime lead only to have it disappear quickly in the second half as Harrison outscored Seaholm 17-11 in the decisive third quarter.

The Maples will travel to Hazel Park Friday.

OU to meet Wayne

Oakland University's men's basketball team will be vying for its half of the "NOLT" trophy when it takes on league rival Wayne State Saturday.

The "NOLT," a handsome wooden trophy given to the winners of the men's and women's contests between OU and Wayne, will be up for grabs starting at 2 and 4:30 p.m. at the Matthaei Building in Detroit.

The trophy competition was inaugurated last year at Oakland. Oakland's women won the net portion of the trophy by beating the Tartars 93-78, while Wayne took the bolt with a men's victory. Oakland has won only one of its last four games under acting head coach Lee Frederick. Frederick took over the coaching duties Jan. 17 when regular coach Jim Mitchell was summoned home because of family illness.

The Pioneers, who upset formerly nationally ranked Wright State in overtime, have lost three games to league opponents Saginaw Valley, Grand State and Ferris State.

The bright spot for the Pioneers was the selection of senior forward Tim Kramer as the Great Lakes Conference "Player of the Week" (Jan. 22-29). Kramer leads the Pioneers in scoring and rebounding with 18.9 and 6.8. He is also the league's rebounding leader with a 19.8 average.

Following the Wayne State game, Oakland's mens team will be at home Feb. 5 for a 7:30 p.m. game against Lake Superior. Oakland will then travel to Northern Kentucky for its last non-conference game of the year Feb. 7.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Junior center Helen Shereda scored past the 1,000 point mark in her college career last week.

The historic moment came during a 27-point performance against Wayne State. The 1,000th point came in the final minutes of the first half as she scored from the inside on an assist from senior guard Kathy Hewitt.

Oakland dropped the game, however, 74-70.

The Pioneers, thanks to

Shereda's 26 points, then rebounded with an 82-63 loss over Ferris State.

The women's team entered its non-conference game against the University of Detroit Monday evening with an 8-7 record, 2-2 in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC).

Friday, the women will host Eastern Illinois University before travelling to Wayne State for the annual "NOLT" game.

OAKLAND WRESTLING

Oakland University's wrestling team took its first tumble of the season over the weekend, losing to Grand Valley State, 36-6. The loss dropped the team's record to 5-1 overall, 3-1 in the conference.

Grand Valley has won the league wrestling

championship four of the past five years. Oakland is in its best season ever under coach Max Hasse.

Individual winners for Oakland against Grand Valley included Phil Liebman at 119 pounds — by a 7-0 decision — and Tim Chapel at 177 — by a 3-2 decision.

OU travels to Adrian Saturday for its last dual meet of the season prior to the Great Lakes Conference championships Feb. 9.
