He then proceeds to burden the household with a cock-roach farm, ex-convicts and bills for long-distance phone calls from the earth's far corners.
Showtime is 8:30 p.m. Audiences can select a dinner-theater option available at each performance. Optional cocktails are at 6:30 p.m., and a served dinner in Heritage Hall is at 7 p.m.
