# Rochester waltzes to 17th straight victory

Andover coach John Maloney is convinced Rochester High School's basketball streak is for real.

"Any team that can win 17 games in a row has got to be good. How many teams in the state have won that many games in a row?" asked Maloney, whose team lost 62-51 to Rochester Friday evening.

"They're (Rochester) a bunch of winners. They're confident, and they play without hesitation," he said. "They've learned how to win the close ones."

And, that's exactly how Andover played Rochester — close. The Falcons — Oakland County's only remaining undefeated high school basketball team — controlled play but never had the game in command.

The visiting Barons were down by as many as 15 points late in the third quarter, but rallied behind the hot outside shooting of junior guard Tim Meter. However, Meter, who missed Andover's last two games with an an-

kle injury, and his teammates could never quite catch up.

ANDOVER CLOSED the gap to 52-45 with just under three minutes remaining and was forced to foul. The Falcons ruined the strategy by making 10 straight foul shots — all in one-on-one situations.

Senior guard Jim Jagels made 10 of 12 free throws for the night, and junior forward Chris Ribant had an exceptional fourth quarter. Each connected in the closing moments for the winners.

As a team, Rochester made 22 of 26 shots.

"We were hurt late in the game by a couple key plays," said Maloney, Andover's second-year head coach. "We missed some key shots which would have brought us to within four points, and we couldn't come up with a loose ball after a jump."

Ribant and Jagels each led Rochester with 16 points. However, it was Ribant who kept the Falcons on top with 12 fourth-quarter points — including four straight baskets.

The biggest bucket came with Rochester holding a 44-34 lead. Ribant sneaked out from his forward position to steal a pass at the top of the key, driving in uncontested for the lay-up.

He then hit two long jumpers before stealing an inbound pass for another two-pointer. The basket gave Rochester a insurmountable 52-41 advantage.

"IT (THE GAME) was nothing spectacular. We just played good, solid ball for four quarters," said Rochester coach John Bailey. "We executed our plays very well, but we missed the easy shots when we had them."

Rochester, which faces a major test Tuesday evening in a non-league battle with North Farmington, started the game in a man-to-man defense. It was the first time this year that the Falcons abandoned their normal 2-3 in favor of single coverage.

"We thought it would catch them off guard a little," said Bailey. "I thought we did all right in it, but we went to the zone because we press better out of the

zone than we do out of the man-to-man."

The Barons took advantage of the opening defense and cruised to a 5-2 lead. The Falcons then switched to zone, and Andover was forced to perimeter shooting and were unable to penetrate as effectively.

Thanks to a pair of late baskets by senior center Gregg Rohlin, Andover tied Rochester at 13 ending the first quarter. Rochester outscored Andover

20-12 in the second quarter for a 33-25 halftime lead.

IN A low-scoring third quarter, Rochester held a 10-7 advantage. Each team scored 19 points in the final eight minutes.

Andover actually made more field goals than Rochester (21-20), but converted only nine of 17 foul shots. The Barons were outscored 26-18.

Meter led the team with 20 points. Rohlin had 14.

## Canton claims WSL title

Plymouth Canton coach Craig Bell was all wet Friday night — after enjoying the traditional throw-him-in-the-shower victories, climaxing the Chiefs' first-ever Western Six League basketball championship.

Canton, which has had no trouble in conference play all season long, got the clincher on its home court, an overwhelming 80-57 victory over Walled Lake Western.

It was all smiles in the Canton locker room following the historic triumph which raised the Chiefs' record to 8-0 in the Western 6 and 14-4 overall.

Bell came out of the shower in his wet clothes displaying a red and white T-shirt which read, Canton — 1979 Western Six League basketball champs.

"It was a present from my brother," the Canton coach said. "He gave it to me last year. I wore it under my shirt but I wasn't going to show it if we had lost."

Bell was, no doubt, pleased with his squad's easy victory and their title quest. And he defended the teams which Canton beat in the league. Northville, the second-place team, is the only

conference club with an above .500 record, besides Canton.

"Any team in the league has five players who can play," Bell said. "And on any given night if you're not ready to play you can lose."

"It's a tribute to our kids that there were no breakdowns. They kept working hard."

"We had all the pressure at the beginning of the season when people said we would win the league. These people were right. We did win the Western 6."

The league title was the number-one goal for Canton this season. Bell said he now wants to go undefeated in loop action. The Chiefs face Churchill Fri. and Northville next Friday to finish the league and regular season schedule.

Butch King led the Chiefs' scoring attack with 26 points. He hit 12 of 19 outside shots and two free throws to pace the way. Rusty Mandile played another outstanding floor game, scoring 12 points, pulling down nine rebounds and adding 11 assists.

These two players, the Chiefs' senior co-captains, have led the way all season.

"We started slowly," Bell said of the Western victory. "But we got great

senior leadership on the floor. We moved the ball around well, offensively. We were not selfish and we took good shots."

Bell added Mike Leary and Mike Gollnick, Canton's two senior inside players, dominated the boards. Dave Visser, a junior forward, also contributed with 19 points.

Western held an early 11-8 lead after the first six minutes of play but the outcome was never in doubt. The Chiefs led 18-13 after the first period, 38-25 at halftime, and scored 26 more points in the third quarter to put the game away.

All the Chiefs reserves saw action the final six minutes of play.

The Chiefs hit on 35 of 75 shot from the floor for 47 percent, while the Warriors hit on only 20 of 75 shots for 27 percent. The Chiefs outrebounded Western 36-24.

"Billins wanted me as a tailback, Central and MSU weren't sure how I'd be used, either on defense or offense. Michigan wanted me as a defensive back."

"I thought it over and figured that, there's only one position to start from as a tailback, and if I didn't make that I wouldn't play much. On defense, there are four positions to choose from and I'd have a better chance to play."

For North, Cohen played a position similar to Michigan's wolfback. But he received most of his publicity as a running back, rushing for nearly 800 yards

and scoring 15 touchdowns. He has been clocked at 4.5 seconds in the 40-yard dash, a figure that had drawn the attention of the scouts.

Cohen first became interested in Michigan last summer at a football camp sponsored by U-M's staff.

"They wanted me more than the others," he explained when asked about his choice.

When not studying his defensive back position on the football field this fall, Cohen will be taking general education classes.

"I'm not certain what I want to go into," he said.
